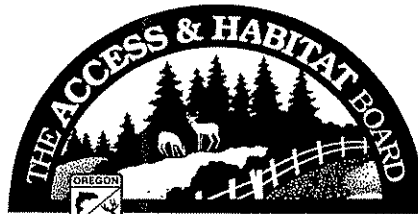

Statement of Interest

Background Information: My formal education consists of a Master of Science degree in Rangeland Resource Management and a Bachelor of Science degree in Fish and Wildlife Management from Montana State University.

As a resident of Oregon approaching the twenty five year mark, I have had the opportunity to gain a wealth of knowledge and practical experience in the various jobs that I have held in both the public and private sectors across the state. In the early stages of my career which was predominately on the west side of the state, I provided service in the public sector for the USDA Forest Service, OSU Department of Rangeland Resources - Extension Service, and the Oregon Department of Agriculture. The primary focus of these positions was on administrative and technical services for a variety of natural resource programs and agricultural issues across the state. During this time I worked with a variety of state and local Boards and Commissions to accomplish a variety of tasks and projects

For the last fifteen plus years, my career has focused upon the private sector with Boise Cascade Corporation, Boise Cascade LLC and now Forest Capital Partners LLC. Areas of work experience have included all aspects of rangeland resource management, wildlife management, wetlands & water quality management, silviculture and reforestation management, forest stewardship administration and land sales.

During this time, I have worked closely with individual producers, leaseholders, contractors, local groups, local governments, and state and federal agencies to provide the necessary input and leadership to find solutions to the ever-increasing environmental pressures facing the agricultural and forest industry. The primary facet of all of my work has dealt with communicating a variety of educational elements to a particular audience. Examples of those elements include program development (team and individual approaches) development and dissemination of written media (news articles, publications, policies, documents and manuals), program presentations, field tours, one-on-one discussions, group discussions, program evaluations, and program implementation.

For all of these years I have lived and worked in eastern Oregon and the one thing that I truly understand and have come to appreciate is the rural lifestyle that focuses upon timber and grazing along with the unique culture that is present in this part of the state.

As for hunting, all of the members of my family (Patti, Camden, Lena, Kelby, and Carson) are avid hunters or at least starter hunters (Carson- Age 6) seeking out deer, elk, upland birds, and migratory waterfowl as time and tags allow. Hunting is especially important to my wife and me as a “family time” for this recreation activity. To reinforce the bird and waterfowl hunting, we currently own a 20 month old Nova Scotia Duck Tolling Retriever. We have been training him for hunting as well as the show ring in Conformation. We plan on starting him soon in Agility and Rally trials.

I have been involved in the Access & Habitat Program as a charter member of the Regional Access & Habitat Advisory Council. I served as a Landowner Representative. Through Boise Cascade Corporation, Boise Cascade LLC and now Forest Capital Partners LLC we have participated in a Cooperative Travel Management Program with the Oregon Department of Fish & Wildlife for over 26+years (Sled Springs Demonstration Area, Catherine Creek, and Flora – ~198,000 acres total). As part of this program we have received the benefits of the A&H program through grants to fund activities of the Fish & Wildlife Department for patrolling, enforcement, and wildlife census for multiple years. And by the way, we are very please with the results! In 2006 we received an A&H grant to bolster our noxious weed control program across our 300,000 acres of ownership. This grant is very much appreciated.

As for my current professional and business memberships, associations, and activities I will name just a few to include: Ducks Unlimited, Oregon Cattleman Association, Society for Range Management. Pacific Northwest Section – Society for Range Management, Oregon Sustainable Forestry Initiative Implementation Committee, Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, Grande Ronde Model Watershed – Technical Advisory Committee and the Tri County Weed Board, 4H Leader – Mt Fanny Stockholders, and Board Member- Nazarene Church.

Some of my past memberships and activities have included: Director/Chair – Union County Soil & Water Conservation District, Union County Farm Bureau, Oregon Farm Bureau – Rangeland Advisory Committee, Cove City Council, Boise Cascade Corporation – Riparian & Wildlife Committee, and Governors Watershed Enhancement Board (GWEB) – Technical and Education Committees, and Technical Advisor to the 45 Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

All in all, the Access and Habitat Program is an important program to foster the relationships between landowners and the hunting community. It has been successful across the state and will continue to do so. I thoroughly enjoyed my time serving on the local A&H Advisory Committee and would appreciate the opportunity to serve on the State A&H Board.

I have been hunting every year, since the age of 12, now I'm 45. My family has been on the same land for the past 3 generations and our livelihood is derived from farming and ranching. For 2 ½ years I worked for a gentleman by the name of Jim Dovenberg who owns Widows Creek Ranch in Dayville, Oregon. He was active in conserving wildlife habitats with the ODFW Habitat Enhancement Program.

As a member of the Elks organization for over 20 years, I served as the Exalted Ruler amongst other officer stations in previous years. Through out this ongoing membership, I have enjoyed meeting with people that have had my same interests and concerns in charities with the priorities being the children and the disabled.

I am at present involved in the CREP (Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program) with our family farm. The focus is to improve a stream riparian area. Eventually we'd like to introduce Beavers to this stream. We'd also be interested in including Sage Grouse, if allowed.

I've aligned with any NRCS (Natural Resources Conservation Service) program applicable. I do believe that conserving the land while compromising on access thus enabling hunting; is a viable endeavor. Our land is currently operated with the underlying thought; take care of the land to take care of our future for our children and teach them the same principal and continue to learn ways to improve conservation plans. One of our current implementations is "no-till" seeding on our wheat land.

Over time I've noticed a depletion of deer on our place and in the county which leads me to believe the problem is also in the outlying areas as well. I don't know what has caused this; whether it be cougars, coyotes, disease, drought or poor habitat. I do believe that a public and ODFW alliance can approach and work toward a viable solution to this problem.

Our farm is involved in the A & H Program. Basically, if someone asks to hunt on our lands, we allow it. Although we had stopped Chukar and Pheasant hunting for a time as the numbers dwindled. We now see these populations are back up which we would like to believe is due to our intervention. The point being , I would like to try different avenues of enhancing and insuring wildlife populations for hunting as well.

I am becoming more involved with the Oregon Wheat Commission, as my main income is derived from Wheat. I've been to meetings and invited to their social functions. We've met with a Korean delegation, which we enjoyed and found the interaction most interesting as to how we here in Oregon can make a difference in our commerce with their country. Even with the cultural differences and language barrier, we were able to

communicate efficiently. I would like to bring this quality to the A & H board. I believe bringing fresh opinions combined with the experience level of those who've "blazed the trail" before us; can be most effective when both sides maintain a "learning and improving" point of view to include more public interaction as the public as a whole is the "front line", so to speak.

I've noticed I've had to become a vocal defender of the ODFW in different conversations lately with friends and other hunters. I believe the ODFW has been unjustly blamed for certain problems outside their realm. When I believe that their collective hands are tied on many issues or are not the correct agency to be blaming.

I see the main breakdown between the public and the ODFW is misinformation and or the lack of information getting to the mainstream public. I am rather computer illiterate and I've discovered that many of our public persons still rely on "one on one" sharing of information.

The fact that landowners can keep people from accessing public lands period; is rather lacking in imagination and lacks compromise, however they do have the right to govern who does go on their property and enforce limits and protection of their lands.

I'm no environmentalist radical however I strive for balance. Without these extreme degrees of opinions and then common sense principals being applied, situations will be more likely to "run a muck".

I have ideas that may promote and or stimulate resolution on these concerns to the benefit of many. I would like to become more involved and educate myself on what has been taking place, how the system works and what the laws are governing our current situations and what is within the objectives of the ODFW and then see if these ideas can effectively take shape or inspire even more possible solutions or point to the correct avenues for resolution.

I am eager to work with the representatives of ODFW on the A & H Board.

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Statement of Interest

I am interested in being appointed to the Access and Habitat Board of the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife because it will give me increased opportunity to work in a field for which I have a burning passion and it will provide Oregon hunters with a mature and forthright advocate.

I grew up in Alaska where hunting was a staple of life and I thrived in that environment. To this day I am an avid hunter and have been lucky enough to hunt most of the big game species in North America as well as waterfowl and upland birds. I have harvested caribou, moose, Dall's sheep, grizzly and black bear, cougar, whitetail, mule deer, Columbia and Sitka Blacktail deer and pronghorn antelope .

As the Oregon State Chairman of the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation from 2003-2005, I worked on several key initiatives in Oregon and saw the importance of enhancing habitat for wildlife and providing a framework in which to preserve our hunting heritage. As the Field Administrator of Oregon Hunters Association from February 2005 until July 2008, I worked with hunters and hunter's issues every day. I worked directly with the OHA Board of Directors where I used my education and extensive leadership experience to help resolve tough issues. I also developed strong corporate relationships within the state and helped raise funds for mission accomplishment.

I have the time and desire to execute the duties as a member of the Access and Habitat Board of the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife in a professional manner and I welcome the challenge!

Background and Experience:

I completed a successful naval career in July, 2000 where I was able to serve my country during both war and peace. I started my career as a Seaman Recruit in 1967 and, through hard work and dogged determination, I finished college and became a commissioned officer in 1971. After commissioning, I completed a Masters Degree in Business Administration and held various leadership positions with increasing degrees of responsibility and accountability. I spent most of my operational career on ships and was promoted to Captain (equivalent to a full Colonel in the other services) in 1993 while serving as the Chief of Staff for a Rear Admiral. During my career I had four different commands where I had bottom line authority and was accountable and responsible for all of the men and equipment assigned to me . At various time I commanded a ship, two shore activities and a Destroyer Squadron where I had command and leadership responsibility for seven Guided Missile Frigates and 2,000 men. During my thirty-three years in the Navy I received numerous personal awards for exceptional performance including three Legions of Merit.

After completing my Navy career, I decided to pursue my passion for wildlife and the outdoors by working for wildlife in organizations with a noble cause. In 2001 I became the first RMEF Oregon Development Director then in 2003 I was selected to become the Oregon State Chairman of the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation a position I held until February, 2005 when I was hired by the Oregon Hunters Association. Both positions were challenging and rewarding and gave me the chance to work with the membership and the public on issues of mutual concern. I am also on the Board of Directors of the Deschutes County Fair and Exposition Center where we oversee management of an \$80,000,000 facility.
