<b>Education</b> (includes all programs impacted by Governor's Education Investment Initiative)		
Outcome Statement(s)	Societal Indicators	Strategies
1. All Oregon's children enter kindergarten ready to learn. 2. All Oregonians advance along the learning pathway as quickly as possible while meeting their individual needs. 3. All Oregonians graduate from high school and are college or career ready. 4. All Oregonians who pursue education beyond high school get a degree or certificate and are ready to contribute to Oregon's economy (subject to refinement by OEIB).	By 2025, every Oregon student must earn a high school diploma, and 80 percent must continue their education beyond high school — with half of those earning associate's degrees or professional or technical certificates, and half achieving a bachelor's degree or more. This is our "40/40/20" goal.	1. Create a coordinated public education system — better integrate our capacities to guide and support activities of educational entities. 2. Focus investments on achieving student outcomes — transition how the state funds education now into a new education investment framework. 3. Build system-wide standards, guidance and support.

Support sustainable business development – invest in key industries for Oregon.</li> <li>2. Provide access to capital – strategically invest in emerging companies that promote local economic development.</li> <li>3. Native plant and wildlife habitat supports diverse wildlife populations.</li> <li>4. Exposure to environmental toxins is minimized and the state is responsive when communities raise concerns about environmental exposures.</li> <li>5. Lands are conserved for healthy natural resource economies, livable communities and healthy environments.</li> <li>6. Feel that their voice has been heard.</li> <li>2. Feel safe where they live and work.</li> <li>3. Have pride in their community.</li> <li>4. The state to be a positive proactive partner in their pursuits through data collection, research, facilitation and leveraging of resources</li> <li>2. Integrated and streamlined planning and project development and implementation at the state, regional and local level on issues pertaining to social equity, the economy and the environment.</li> <li>3. A prioritization of investments by the state, in coordination with all interested parties including local jurisdictions, which leverage more than one narrow objective but rather keep people, air, water and the environment healthy while providing for a healthy economy in all areas of the state.</li> <li>4. Leverage investments, incentivize actions, and coordinate agencies at state, regional, and local levels to maximize resources.</li> <li>2. 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<b>Safety</b> (includes traditional public safety programs as well as human service programs that protect vulnerable people)

Create a Good Citizenship Class of 2025.</li> <li>2. Improve government transparency of the budget, revenue, and performance.</li> <li>3. Create a Citizen Panel for Engagement.</li> <li>4. Develop flexible service delivery models for citizens across government.</li> <li>5. Focus agency resources on service delivery and provide tools and accountability mechanisms for success.</li> <li>6. Develop an ongoing mechanism to review administrative support functions across state government to continually improve and streamline central support services.</li> <li>7. Identify categories of reserve funds, establish reasonable baseline funding and fund the reserves before operations.</li> </ol>
