Retired from the Bureau of Land Management in 1997. During my career I worked in 5 western states. I worked in the rangeland mgmt, reatly and minerals, timber, land use planning and environmental programs. I was an area manager in N.E. Nevada for the area that had the largest migratory

I have been hunting every year, since the age of 12, now I'm 45. My family has been on the same land for the past 3 generations and our livelihood is derived from farming and ranching. For 2 ½ years I worked for a gentleman by the name of Jim Dovenberg who owns Widows Creek Ranch in Dayville, Oregon. He was active in conserving wildlife habitats with the ODFW Habitat Enhancement Program.

As a member of the Elks organization for over 20 years, I served as the Exalted Ruler amongst other officer stations in previous years. Through out this ongoing membership, I have enjoyed meeting with people that have had my same interests and concerns in charities with the priorities being the children and the disabled.

I am at present involved in the CREP (Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program) with our family farm. The focus is to improve a stream riparian area. Eventually we'd like to introduce Beavers to this stream. We'd also be interested in including Sage Grouse, if allowed.

I've aligned with any NRCS (Natural Resources Conservation Service) program applicable. I do believe that conserving the land while compromising on access thus enabling hunting; is a viable endeavor. Our land is currently operated with the underlying thought; take care of the land to take care of our future for our children and teach them the same principal and continue to learn ways to improve conservation plans. One of our current implementations is "no-till" seeding on our wheat land.

Over time I've noticed a depletion of deer on our place and in the county which leads me to believe the problem is also in the outlying areas as well. I don't know what has caused this; whether it be cougars, coyotes, disease, drought or poor habitat. I do believe that a public and ODFW alliance can approach and work toward a viable solution to this problem.

Our farm is involved in the A & H Program. Basically, if someone asks to hunt on our lands, we allow it. Although we had stopped Chukar and Pheasant hunting for a time as the numbers dwindled. We now see these populations are back up which we would like to believe is due to our intervention. The point being , I would like to try different avenues of enhancing and insuring wildlife populations for hunting as well.

I am becoming more involved with the Oregon Wheat Commission, as my main income is derived from Wheat. I've been to meetings and invited to their social functions. We've met with a Korean delegation, which we enjoyed and found the interaction most interesting as to how we here in Oregon can make a difference in our commerce with their country. Even with the cultural differences and language barrier, we were able to

communicate efficiently. I would like to bring this quality to the A & H board. I believe bringing fresh opinions combined with the experience level of those who've "blazed the trail" before us; can be most effective when both sides maintain a "learning and improving" point of view to include more public interaction as the public as a whole is the "front line", so to speak.

I've noticed I've had to become a vocal defender of the ODFW in different conversations lately with friends and other hunters. I believe the ODFW has been unjustly blamed for certain problems outside their realm. When I believe that their collective hands are tied on many issues or are not the correct agency to be blaming.

I see the main breakdown between the public and the ODFW is misinformation and or the lack of information getting to the mainstream public. I am rather computer illiterate and I've discovered that many of our public persons still rely on "one on one" sharing of information.

The fact that landowners can keep people from accessing public lands period; is rather lacking in imagination and lacks compromise, however they do have the right to govern who does go on their property and enforce limits and protection of their lands.

I'm no environmentalist radical however I strive for balance. Without these extreme degrees of opinions and then common sense principals being applied, situations will be more likely to "run a muck".

I have ideas that may promote and or stimulate resolution on these concerns to the benefit of many. I would like to become more involved and educate myself on what has been taking place, how the system works and what the laws are governing our current situations and what is within the objectives of the ODFW and then see if these ideas can effectively take shape or inspire even more possible solutions or point to the correct avenues for resolution.

I am eager to work with the representatives of ODFW on the A & H Board.

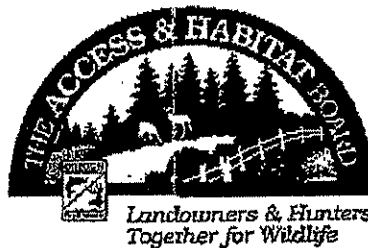

Statement of Interest

I was born in Lewiston, Idaho and spent most of my childhood in eastern Washington. I attended Central Washington State College, and Washington State University. I have been an Oregon resident for 29 years. Twenty-four of those years have been in rural Halfway in eastern Oregon.

I am interested in serving on the A&H Board because I am now retired from the US Forest Service and believe I could contribute a depth of knowledge and experience to the Board. I would like to promote habitat improvement plus work toward improving hunting access on non-public lands.

Your application will be evaluated using the following criteria:

1. **Experience and knowledge of hunting or knowledge and breadth of experience in the agriculture or forestry industries.**
 - I worked for the US Forest Service (USFS) for 30 years in natural resource management. Primary areas of responsibility included range management, forestry, and wildlife management.
 - As a wildlife biologist for the USFS (from 1987 – 2005) I planned and implemented a variety of habitat improvement projects. I also worked with foresters and range managers to mitigate wildlife issues.
 - I have worked on ranches my entire life. I helped my grandfather manage livestock on private rangelands near Lewiston, Idaho. Throughout high school and college I worked seasonally on cattle ranches as a ranch hand. The largest of which was a 3000 head cattle ranch. I also worked on a seed farm in the Willamette Valley.
 - From 1984 to present I have owned small acreages which I have farmed and/or ranched either full or part time. I have primarily raised sheep. For diversification, I also raise cattle, hay and grain crops. The sheep operation included market and locker lambs. The operation varied from a high of 1000 ewes to just a few bumper lambs.
 - I have been a rifle and bow hunter since age 12. I enjoy hunting big game, wild turkey, and upland game birds. I purchase the Sportsman Package annually.

2. Involvement in sportsman/hunter/conservation organizations or experience with fish & wildlife resource management issues.

- I initiated partnership projects with a variety of wildlife/hunter organizations (Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, National Wild Turkey Federation, ODFW, and Ducks Unlimited). My key part in these partnerships was to identify the need for projects on public land, explain the project objectives to representatives of the organizations, to follow through with implementation, and to submit final reports to all parties on the achievement of objectives.
- I have participated in several wildlife research studies. I secured partnership funding for the studies, acted as a liaison between scientists and the USFS, assisted in fieldwork with the study leaders. The studies were:
 - Twin Lakes Fire Bird Study; fire effects on neotropical birds.
 - Neotropical Bird Habitat Study.
 - Spotted Frog Habitat, affects from livestock grazing.
 - Idaho Power Company Bull Trout migration study.

- I interacted with ODFW developing good relations between them and the USFS. I coordinated ODFW actions on USFS managed lands:
 - habitat improvement projects
 - travel and access management
 - mountain goat and wild turkey releases
 - reintroduction of big horn sheep
- I have been a member of, and involved in, the professional groups:
 - Oregon Sheep Growers
 - The Range Society.
- I have been a member of various hunting and wildlife organizations:
 - Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation (RMEF)
 - National Wild Turkey Federation (NWTf)
 - Ducks Unlimited (DU), committee member
 - The Wildlife Society of Oregon (TWS)

- I was a range management specialist for the USFS for approximately six years. I administered sheep and cattle allotments. I dealt with permittees in order to achieve management objectives, develop range management improvement projects (fences, pipelines, water guzzlers, seeding, prescribed burns), and to achieve USFS standards and guidelines.
- During my career with the USFS, I was often a member and/or leader of Inter Disciplinary Teams who conducted environmental assessments regarding timber sales, allotment management plans, prescribed fire plans, and wildlife habitat project plans. As a team member I interacted with various natural resource managers and professionals to resolve issues, mitigate impacts, and still achieve the objectives of any given proposal.

6. Ability/interest in working collaboratively with others:

- I have worked with the Halfway School district to educate and involve students regarding wildlife and public land management. Projects have included building and placement of bird boxes, raptor surveys, senior project mentorship, and Youth Conservation Corps wildlife enhancement projects.

7. Participation in the A&H program

- As a citizen of a small community that is tied closely to the land, I have been aware of many access issues and challenges. Frustration over changing private land management has often been a topic of conversation. I have close relationships with both landowners and hunters. I understand both sides of the issues and can identify with their concerns.
- Public land travel and access issues have been an integral part of my professional life. I have worked closely with ODFW to develop travel plans that help to improve hunting experiences as well as mitigate impacts on wildlife and other natural resources.

8. Ability to foster positive relations between landowners, hunters and ODFW.

- Through many wildlife projects that were partnered between hunter organizations, wildlife organizations, ODFW and the USFS, I was able to enhance communications between all parties. I developed a relationship with ODFW personnel that was open and trusting.

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Charles Moyer Statement of Interest

I would like to be considered for the landowner position on the Access & Habitat Board. I look forward to working with the ODFW, landowners and hunting groups to help with access and habitat issues.

Currently I work for The Campbell Group in their Portland headquarters as an Inventory Analyst. The Campbell Group manages over 2.9 million acres of timberlands for various clients throughout the United States, with over 280,000 acres in Oregon.

I received my Bachelors of Science in Forest Resource Management from the University of Washington in 1996. During college I worked for Longview Fibre cruising timber on their various tree farms across Oregon and Washington. I worked for the Makah Tribe in Neah Bay, Washington for two years dealing with all aspects of forest management and tribal land management issues. I worked with the tribal council to get budgets approved and their acceptance of timber sale packages.

I joined the Society of American Foresters (SAF) in 1995. I served as a Secretary/Treasurer at the chapter level while in Neah Bay and helped develop the program for the Washington State SAF meeting in Port Townsend in 1997.

In 1998 I took a position with Simpson Timber Company in Shelton, Washington. I worked as a GIS/Forester dealing with mapping, inventory and other forestry-related projects including working on their Habitat Conservation Plan. Three years later I accepted a promotion to an Area Forester position on their Oregon timberlands, based in Tillamook. The company has since changed its name to Green Diamond Resource Company and has sold the majority of its holdings in Oregon to Hancock Forest Management and Olympic Resource Management.

At Green Diamond I dealt with all aspects of silviculture, beginning with cleanup following logging, chemical spraying, planting trees, treating and burning slash, pre-commercial thinning and other forestry-related activities. I was the main contact in Oregon for Green Diamond regarding hunting issues from beaver trapping and bear hunters to the general public for the deer and elk seasons. I worked with local ODFW staff and ODF foresters to push for an emergency hunt that later became a controlled hunt to deal with heavy elk damage on newly planted clearcuts in the Salmonberry area within the boundary of the old Tillamook burn. We met with the local Oregon Hunters Association (OHA) chapter to keep them informed of the damage and the progress of the hunts. I also worked with the Tillamook Chapter of the OHA to provide limited access areas for "walk-in only" hunting areas during the deer and elk seasons.

I regularly attended landowner meetings with local ODFW representatives (Herman Biederbeck, Doug Cottan and Nancy Taylor) on the success of the emergency and controlled hunts and also to review additional damage areas and potential changes to hunts. I worked with the Access & Habitat programs for the Lincoln County Timberland Patrol and the North Coast Access Area.

In 2005 I worked with the ODF and ODFW to develop the field tour for the ODFW wildlife commission's September tour and meeting in Tillamook. I have also worked with the ODFW on

various landowner preference tags over several years to assist in areas that were experiencing heavy animal damage, usually elk. I think these tools have been a great success.

In 2007 I took a Forester position with Weyerhaeuser in Seaside on the North Coast Forest Area. I represented the company with the Oregon Forest Industries Council-Animal Damage Committee and acted as the Treasurer for the Northwest Oregon Animal Damage Cooperative. The Northwest Oregon Animal Damage Cooperative pools resources among various timberland owners to hire trappers/snaremen to specifically target bear that are peeling young stands of timber. I also worked with a variety of watershed councils throughout Northwest Oregon to restore and improve salmon habitat.

In 2009 Weyerhaeuser sold their Seaside tree farm to The Campbell Group, during that transition I took a position with The Campbell Group in the Portland headquarters.

I currently live in Knappa, Oregon a few miles east of Astoria with my wife and three children. Since establishing residency in Oregon I have been able to harvest my first elk on timberlands that I managed. Over the years I have harvested a few more elk, as well as salmon, steelhead and other sport fish.

8. Ability to foster positive relations between landowners, hunters and ODFW.

I've been hunting since I was 12 years old. I would have to say that I've been an avid outdoors person since I started college in 1995. I've hunted almost every species in OR except for Mt. Goat as I've not drawn a tag or known any one that has. I have two degrees from OSU, the first in Range Land Management and the second in Crop Science. I'm part of a small business (Bolson Seed Co. LLC) where we grow native grass seed for government agencies. I've also volunteered for NFP organization (GROWISER) where we promoted the production of native plants by collecting seed, sowing, and weed control on a 200+ acre sight. Part of the volunteer work included giving tours, continuing education for teachers, and informing the public about benefits of native plants and agriculture. I've recently purchased a 107 acre farm in Cove, OR where I raise horses and mules for personal use and hay about 30 acres. The remainder of the property is in grass and wheat production. Since I work for Boise Cascade, I'm directly connected to the forest industry and stay aware of the current forestry issues on both public and private property. My current position is Plant Superintendent of the Boise Particleboard Plant located in LaGrande Oregon.

My involvement in hunting organizations has all been on a membership basis (OHA, NRA, DU, and OUSDA). I have volunteered my time to take part in youth pheasant hunts as well as bird box building. As far as working with ODFW, I've participated in surveys and opinion polls.

Leadership positions have all occurred on a professional basis through employment with Boise Cascade.

I've participated in hunts that have occurred on A&H properties. I have a great interest as this can be a win/win situation for both parties. I feel I have a good knowledge base for what is needed and the type of properties that are sought after for both small and big opportunities. Being an avid outdoors person, and being a part of that group has given

me a lot of insight into the different perspectives that exist. Having a good understanding of the issues on both sides of the spectrum will create a system that will work for all parties. Being both a landowner and a sportsman I have the ability to asses the needs of both parties. I've hunted other states as well as Canada and with these experiences I've seen and used like opportunities (A&H) across the western states. This would also come in handy for ideas and opportunities for Oregon.

From my perspective all users of natural resources need to work together to preserve the opportunities/rights that exist today. Farmers, Ranchers, Foresters, and Sportsmen alike need to be united and stand side by side on the same front. The A&H program is a platform for this to occur. This is a process that I would like to be a part of and make a positive difference.
