Subject: Testimony on the Siskiyou Plus Bear Hunt

Good morning. I'm Lin Bernhardt and here on behalf of myself and my husband. We own a hay farm here in Jackson County and run a small bed and breakfast.

Being farmers, we're vitally interested in our natural resources, and being a former natural resources manager, I'm vitally interested in managing those resources scientifically and ethically. I hold a master's degree in natural resource geography and spent 30 years working for state and local governments on environmental issues. I also taught natural resource policy at Marylhurst University.

I strongly oppose this proposal for scientific, ethical and public policy reasons.

Most wildlife species have self-limiting populations, and this includes black bears. It's difficult to gauge the natural carrying capacity for bears, but cannot be gauged by the number of bear-human conflicts. Education has been very effective, and as people change their behaviors, these conflicts diminish. There are examples in the literature of high population density and low conflict, and vice versa. Nor can it be gauged by the degree of tree damage, which can certainly be extensive. This problem can be dealt with through a variety of silvicultural practices. In addition, the Washington Forest Protection Association has determined that a supplemental feeding program is the first option for control. When bears have the opportunity to feed on pellets with a high concentration of sugar, they tend to feed on the pellets rather than strip bark from trees, reducing the need for lethal damage control.

It should also be noted that bears provide significant ecological benefits, including benefits to a host of other wildlife species.

But my primary concern is one of ethics. The data is clear that hunters cannot tell the difference between female and male bears. As the season is expanded, females with cubs will undoubtedly be killed. As one Wyoming Game and Fish official was quoted "it is often very difficult to determine the gender of a black bear." To kill females with young cubs means a 100% mortality rate for the orphaned cubs.

We cannot be so embroiled in numbers and data that we forget to look at wildlife with compassion. Animals are more than resources to be harvested. They are living beings who raise families, exist within social orders, and have the capacity to suffer. Leaving cubs to starve to death is inhumane, unethical, and just plain wrong. From a public policy point of view, this proposal is a disaster.

So please, bag this proposal. It's wrong all the way around.

Re: Proposed 2015 Siskiyou Plus Bear Hunt

Dear Chair Levy and Commission Members,

The proposed 2015 "Siskiyou Plus Bear Hunt" would make available 250 spring bear hunting tags in addition to the 4,400 already allotted for the Southwest Region of Oregon. Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife ("Department") proposed the hunt solely for the purpose of attracting more hunters to the area. The undersigned organizations urge the Commission to reject this proposed increase in spring bear hunting.

Our organizations are concerned that this increased springtime hunting of bears will place cubs at risk, directly or indirectly leading to increased costs to the state and Oregonians. Spring bear hunts already pose a great threat to bears when they are most vulnerable. At this time, bears are emerging from winter hibernation. Black bears do not emerge from their dens at all during hibernation—not even for food and water. After this long period of inactivity, the bears remain lethargic for a couple weeks while they replenish nutrients.

Although hunters are not permitted to kill cubs less than one year of age or mothers with cubs less than one year of age, increased springtime hunting results in a heightened probability of the killing of mother bears that have young cubs. Mother bears care for cubs from the time of birth in January until June of the following year—17 months—so orphaned cubs are extremely susceptible to death from starvation or exposure to the elements. Even following the regulations, cubs will be orphaned during the final seven months of rearing. Further, mother bears tend to forage great distances from their cubs, so it is not unlikely that mothers with cubs younger than a year old will be accidentally killed.

The orphaning of bear cubs is not only a tragic circumstance, but these cubs lead to high costs for the Department and the public. If discovered, any Departmental response to orphaned cubs require the expenditure of a large amount of resources to either euthanize, relocate, monitor, or place the cubs in temporary or permanent captivity. The Department needs to determine whether the \$3,750 it will generate if it sells every extra tag, will outweigh potential costs associated with just a single orphaned cub.

Additionally, if orphaned cubs are not discovered by the Department or found and left to fend for themselves, these cubs tend to become increasingly reliant upon humans for survival, leading to increased conflicts between humans and bears. This raises increased public safety concerns, and further Departmental costs for addressing these wildlife conflicts.

Wildlife is of great concern to all Oregonians, and the Department and Commission is under statutory direction to maintain all species of wildlife at optimum levels. While bear populations have been estimated to be healthy (between 25,000 and 30,000 individuals) in Oregon, recent population estimates out of California show that bear populations formerly believed to be healthy, have dropped by a combined 25% over the past two years. If the Department wants to pursue increased bear hunting

in the state, efforts should be made to generate population numbers/estimates before such efforts are undertaken.

Dear Chair Levy and Commissioners:

On behalf of the Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) and our supporters in Oregon, I submit the following comments in objection to the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife's (ODFW's) proposal to increase the quota on cougars by 25 percent (from 777 to 970) so as to grow elk and deer herds. For the following reasons stated herein, we remain concerned that the ODFW has failed to show: 1) how the agency determined that the cougar population has grown by 96 percent statewide since 1994; and 2) that cougars are affecting ungulate (deer and elk) herd numbers.

I. The HSUS Request Better Cougar Management:

Oregon's cougars, an important component of our natural heritage, deserve excellent management so that their populations are conserved for future generations—including for an expanded stakeholder base (Jacobson et al. 2010). Large-bodied carnivores require adequate prey and freedom from the threat of human persecution in order to persist (Noss et al. 1996).

Because the major source of mortality of cougars in the West comes from sport hunting (Cougar Management Guidelines 2005), we ask the ODFW commission to encourage better stewardship of Oregon's cougars and to review the literature review we have provided here on predation.

Oregon has little reliable information about the state's cougar population. The ODFW has used one study to extrapolate cougar-population densities statewide without making adjustments for site-specific topography, prey base, habitat, land use, and historic or ongoing management regimes. We understand that last year the agency sent its population density estimate out for peer review, but the result of that effort has not been revealed to us.

The HSUS believes that Oregon can achieve better science-based management if it uses sound science to determine the cougar population size, develop a cougar management plan, and protect breeding females, the biological bank account.

Mountain lions generally occur in low densities because they are an obligate carnivores and their food is patchily distributed (Logan and Sweaner 2001). Contrary to popular myth: cougars are fairly rare in the landscape because of their energetic needs and their unsocial nature.

Sport hunting can change the demographics (sex and age) and density of a cougar population (Lambert et al. 2006, Stoner et al. 2006, Robinson et al. 2008, Cooley et al. 2009a, Cooley et al. 2009b). If the cougar in a home range is removed or killed, the vacancy likely will attract a younger, dispersing animal (Lambert et al. 2006). Over-hunting a lion population can change the age structure to one with more young adults or juveniles (Lambert et al. 2006, Stoner et al. 2006, Robinson et al. 2008)(Beausoleil et al. 2013). The removal of 40 percent of the nonjuvenile population for four years or more reduces the number of individuals in a population, and creates a demographic structure that is younger, produces fewer kittens, and is socially unstable (Stoner et al. 2006). High harvest rates on adult females harms a population's ability to recruit new members (Anderson and Lindzey 2005). Therefore, both hunting and predator-control programs could potentially destabilize a cougar population, which could, ironically, lead to increased conflicts with humans and livestock (Lambert et al. 2006, Robinson et al. 2008).

We offer three suggestions to better improve cougar management in Oregon:

a) Estimate lion populations for each hunting district. The most reliable method to derive lion populations is from radio-telemetry studies (Cougar Management Guidelines 2005, p. 44).

- The Cougar Management Guidelines (2005) provide: *Density estimates from one study area can only be extrapolated cautiously to larger areas including regions or entire states because most researchers study cats where they are the most abundant (areas that are atypical), and in the best available lion habitats.* Extrapolation to larger areas fails to accommodate changes in vegetation, land use, topography, and management history (p. 47-8).
- Population trends must be determined using reliable methodologies; however, *sightings, depredation events, and kill levels are not reliable means to indexing a population* (Cougar Management Guidelines 2005, p. 48-50).

b) Write a management plan that enumerates and justifies management goals for each district. Both decision makers and stakeholders need to understand the state's long-term vision for cougars. Setting goals reduces annual tensions over quota-setting. We offer examples from two other states, which have developed cougar management plans.

The Colorado Parks and Wildlife, for example, has elaborated goals for managing cougars in each of its hunting districts, called data analysis units or DAUs. Its document, *Colorado Mountain Lion Management Data Analysis Unit Revision & Quota Development Process* provides:

A guide of 8-15% of the huntable population was used as a range of acceptable total mortality for populations managed for a stable-increasing DAU management

strategy. For suppression management strategies, the total mortality guide was >15% to 28% of the huntable population. Within the range of 8% - 28%, managers could select a range of removal that fit conditions within their DAU and consistent with the desired management prescription. The broad 8% - 28% range was viewed as a continuum. Removal rates at the lower end of the scale would most likely result in population growth, whereas removal rates at the upper end would most likely result in population suppression.

In Washington, wildlife managers established hunting zones of 1,000 km² to evenly distribute harvest on the landscape (Beausoleil et al. 2013). Beausoleil et al. (2013) suggest that wildlife managers use a cougar density of 1.7 cougars/100 km². They further suggest a harvest of no more than 14 percent of the resident adults to avoid overkill (Beausoleil et al. 2013). They warn, however, that hunter mortality is additive to various forms of mortality including intraspecific strife; prey-pursuit injuries; motor-vehicle collisions; poaching; and disease, and that wildlife managers need to be cognizant of this when setting hunting quotas (Beausoleil et al. 2013).

While Oregon presented its non-hunter cougar mortality as part of its Big Game Regulation Proposal Overview, it failed to supply both the Commission and the public with the amount of hunter-induced mortality to cougars, a major oversight that leaves the public and the decision maker without access to critical information.

c. Protect breeding females and dependent kittens. Anderson and Lindzey (2005) write, “adult females provide the resiliency in a population that allows it to respond to loss of members” (p. 187). Breeding females must be conserved to protect the species.

A female cougar is not sexually mature until she is between 27 and 29 months old (Cougar Management Guidelines 2005). They produce few kittens. A mother will give birth to approximately three kittens every two years (Cougar Management Guidelines 2005). Females then spend between 12 and 24 months raising and provisioning for their kittens. Kittens are totally reliant upon their mother until they are at least six months old,¹ but may be wholly dependent for up to nine months and even beyond. In new research, biologists suggest that kittens up to 12 months of age are likely incapable of dispatching prey animals on their own (Elbroch and Quigley 2012).

Hunter harvest results not only in the death of a mother cat but has an additive effect of causing kitten orphaning and starvation and population reduction (Robinson et al. 2014a).

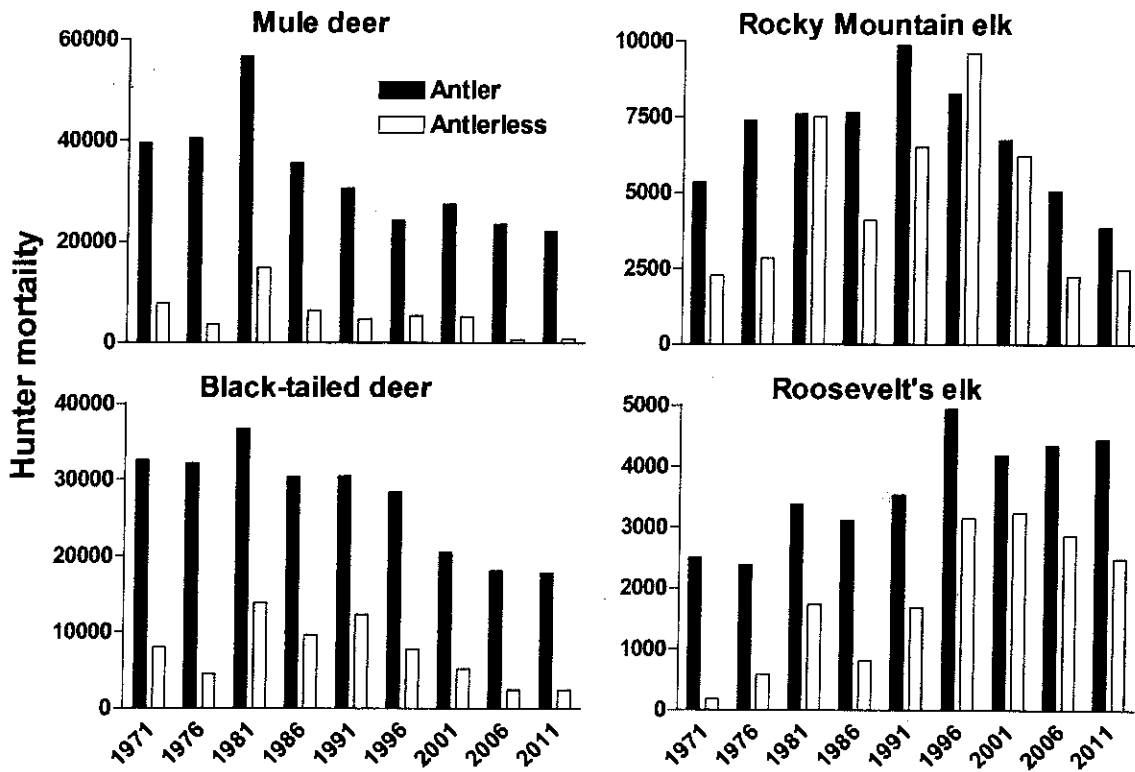
II. The best available science demonstrates that killing native carnivores to increase ungulate populations is unlikely to produce positive results.

¹ “Kittens are generally able to climb to avoid dogs at about 3 months of age, but kittens orphaned when they are 6 months old have a less than 5% chance of survival, and most die from starvation” (Cougar Management Guidelines Working Group 2005), p. 78.

We have attached a synopsis of some of the most recent studies on mule deer to counter unscientific claims found in the ODFW’s document concluding that cougar are effecting ungulate numbers. While this literature review is particular to mule deer, the principles would apply equally to black-tailed deer and elk management.

a. Access to adequate nutrition is the key factor in mule deer dynamics. Each year, some mule deer are “doomed surplus” who die no matter what.

Mule deer populations in the western United States have experienced population declines over the latter part of the last century because of a myriad of factors including habitat loss or fragmentation, changes in forage quality, competition with other ungulates, predation, disease, increased hunting, poaching, stochastic weather events, fire suppression, noxious weeds, overgrazing by livestock, energy development, and changes in hydrology caused by global warming—including changes in snow pack and temperature (e.g., Forrester and Wittmer 2013, Monteith et al. 2014).



Above is a figure showing hunter mortality of ungulates in Oregon. According to a bevy of researchers, human hunters are an important factor in limiting deer and elk herds around the West.

In their review article that surveyed 48 predation studies involving mule deer, Forrester and Wittmer determined that while predation was the “primary proximate cause of mortality for all age classes” of deer that predator removal studies indicate that “predation is compensatory, particularly at high deer densities, and that nutrition and weather shape population dynamics” (2013: 292). In other words, each year, some deer are “doomed surplus”; that is, they die no matter what (Monteith et al. 2014, citing Errington 1946). The question is whether deer die from predation or some other cause, especially malnutrition.

Nutritional ecology is the science of an animal in its environment relative to its nutritional interactions. Nutritional availability to deer affects their behaviors (including reproduction and recruiting new members to the herd). Nutritional ecology also incorporates how climate (weather – the amount of precipitation) and predation effect deer demographics (Monteith et al. 2014).

The scientific literature is clear that large herbivores are limited by their food resources (e.g., Monteith et al. 2014). Young animals that have access to fewer nutritional reserves are less likely to survive – a theory that has been well tested in Colorado and the West (Watkins et al. 2002, Pojar and Bowden 2004, Bishop et al. 2009, Monteith et al. 2014). Mule deer survival is absolutely reliant on deers’ ability to gain access to adequate nutrition – but that nutrition can be hindered by weather, habitat loss, oil and gas development, fire suppression, and other causes. To underscore, the underpinnings of ungulate population density is their access to nutrition, or what biologist call their “nutritional carrying capacity” (Monteith et al. 2014).

b. Studies show that killing native carnivores fails to grow deer herds.

If predators kill more deer beyond what would otherwise happen from all the other causes of death, that extra mortality is called “additive mortality.” But if predators kill deer that would die even if there was no predation, that mortality is generally considered to be “compensatory mortality.” Teasing out the two causes of mortality to determine deer population dynamics is what many studies of mule deer focus upon.

But in a new study, biologists Monteith et al. (2014) caution against assuming mortalities are purely compensatory or additive. Based on assumptions, additive mortality would only occur when ungulates are in “superb nutritional condition” and their density is well below the nutritional carrying capacity. Whereas, based on assumptions, compensatory mortality could only occur when nutrition limits a population and the ungulate mortality does not “exceed the nutritional potential for survival and reproduction” (Monteith et al. 2014, p. 41).

In their study, Monteith et al. (2014) found that both additive and compensatory mortality can occur in a single year and “should be viewed as a continuum rather than as a dichotomy” (p. 41). Mountain lion predation on mule deer in California was likely additive during one time period of an increasing deer population, but it did not stop the growth of the population, which indicates that resource availability (food) is important to mule deer (Pierce et al. 2012). The condition of the deer were strongly correlated with the availability of nutrition, and thus mountain lion

predation during a deer decline was not an additive source of mortality (Pierce et al. 2012). The deer were in poor physical condition and reproductive rates were low, indicating that nutrition not predation caused the decline (Pierce et al. 2012).

In five recent studies that involved predator removal, the ones that involved coyotes “generally had no effect” (Forrester and Wittmer 2013, p. 300). Authors found that “both coyote and mountain lion predation was compensatory rather than additive” (Forrester and Wittmer 2013, p. 300). In other words, if predators had been absent from those ecosystems, the deer would have died from some other cause of mortality anyway.

Bishop et al. (2009), in their long-term, Colorado-based study found that food limited the deer population, but especially the quality of winter-range habitats. They determined that if deer had access to adequate nutrition that neither mountain lions nor coyotes negatively affected the deer population. They also suggest that mountain lions selected for deer that had poor body condition (Bishop et al. 2009). In a follow up, Colorado-based study, Bergman et al. (2014) found that managing winter range for deer, weed control and reseeding, benefitted deer greatly.

In a long-term study in Idaho, where mountain lions and coyotes endured heavy-killing regimes in study areas, that massive amounts of native carnivore killing failed to change the population trends for mule deer. Hurley et al. (2011) conclude that the benefits of predator killing are marginal and short term in nature, and more important, the killing failed to change the long-term dynamics of mule deer population.

If Oregon wants to grow the its ungulate population, then the agency must foster survival of adult female mule deer to stem declines, and that nutritional condition is the most important single factor for mule deer survival (e.g., Forrester and Wittmer 2013, Monteith et al. 2014, Robinson et al. 2014b).

Because of climate change and other anthropogenic changes in mule deer habitats, the carrying capacity of mule deer has declined in their range throughout western North America (Anderson et al. 2012, Monteith et al. 2014). Monteith et al. (2014: 42) suggest that wildlife managers should assess body condition of ungulates (the amount of body fat) as part of their monitoring to “disentangle” the effects of “habitat alteration, climate, and predation.”

IV. Conclusion:

The HSUS opposes the 25 percent increase in the cougar-hunting quota, and requests that the ODFW implement a cougar management plan based upon the best available science with goals in each district that can be justified. Killing cougars to bolster ungulate numbers is not supported by a host of biological studies, including some of the latest research we provide here. Deer and elk face reductions from several factors, but rarely are cougars one of them. Limiting the cougar population will not make deer or elk herds suddenly appear.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment regarding the ODFW staff proposals for 2015 big game hunting regulation changes.

OBH (and other hunting organizations) voiced several objections to ODFW's 2015 big game proposals when they were first presented to the Commission at their June meeting. OBH commends the ODFW staff for listening to the objections raised by OBH and other hunting organizations at the Commission's June meeting, and for improving the proposals now being presented for your consideration.

OBH supports the following 2015 big game proposals now being presented for adoption by the Commission:

- Eliminating the requirement to have a controlled elk tag in order to hunt deer in the Wenaha, Walla Walla and Mt. Emily units, and establishing 30-day controlled deer hunts in the units instead.
- Establishing a late controlled archery hunt for Whitetail deer in the Wenaha unit.
- Eliminating the requirement to have a controlled elk tag in order to hunt deer in the Sled Springs and Chesnimnus units.
- Eliminating control of archery deer hunting in the Steens Mountain unit.
- Eliminating the earlier proposal to make the controlled "one elk" tags in the Sled Springs, Chesnimnus, Heppner, Ukiah and Snake River units a bowhunter's only elk hunting opportunity
- Eliminating the requirement to have a controlled deer tag in order to hunt elk in the Maury and Warner units.

Of all of the 2015 ODFW proposals impacting bowhunting and bowhunters, OBH questions only the proposal to control archery elk hunting in the Warner unit at this time. The Warner unit has never been a significant archery elk hunting destination. The number of bowhunters hunting elk in the Warner unit was reportedly never greater than 49 hunters between 2003 and 2012 and was usually substantially fewer, and bowhunters reported harvesting only two (2) total elk during that entire 10-year period. It clearly seems a waste of time and money for ODFW to control archery elk hunting in the Warner unit! OBH believes this kind of unnecessary regulation is especially a problem coming at a time when ODFW wants us to pay higher license and tag fees to support their operations!

NO ELECTRONICS ON ARCHERY TACKLE, Lighted Nocks



Chair Levy, Members of the Commission, Director *Melcher*, FOR THE RECORD; my name is Kevin Thompson; I serve as the President of TRADITIONAL ARCHERS OF OREGON (TAO).

On behalf of TAO, I wish to restate TAO's position regarding:

1. **NO ELECTRONICS ON ARCHERY TACKLE, specifically to the subject of Lighted Nocks**

In spite of the continued pressure to promote technology adoption in Oregon archery seasons, TAO's position remains unchanged – NO ELECTRONICS ON BOARD. We continue to maintain that the adoption of lighted nocks is the starting point for continued technology adoption. Oregon Big Game archery resources cannot absorb continued advancement in weaponry which aids increased hunter "Shot Opportunity" without adverse effects in overall BG archery sport tag opportunities.

Standard rationale for allowing an exception for lighted nocks is, they aid the shooter in knowing where the arrow strikes an animal and recovering the arrow. It is also stated they offer no pre-shot advantage to the hunter.

From reading and listening to countless success stories in recent years, it is obvious that today's 300 FPS+ modern compound bows are capable of helping more bow shooters to achieve success by taking 75+ yard shots at deer and elk. You must also remember that part of the modern archer's arsenal is slender, black, carbon arrows with minimum fletch making them difficult to see in low light conditions typically encountered while hunting.

TAO submits the real need for lighted nocks is to enable and encourage bow shooters to expand their range and enhance video replays for recovery on marginal hits.

Please continue to stay true to Oregon's current archery tackle rules and regulations that match the original intent of providing hunting opportunity and experience with primitive weapons (Bow and Arrow).

Predator Defense opposes the proposed increase in cougar zone kill quotas for a number of reasons.

The Cougar Quota chart which is attached to my email message shows the mortality levels in the zones are not even close to reaching the current quota, with the exception of Zone A where the quota was exceeded in the last 3 years resulting in closure of hunting at the very end of the season. Rather than increase the quota for the entire state, we'd suggest that curtailing hunting in that zone at the season's end would be a more moderate and appropriate response. Please note that the quota does not apply to removal of cougars posing a threat to people or livestock. Oregon's laws are very liberal allowing removal of cougars for damage and public safety.

Cougar mortality is at an all time high in Oregon, as indicated by the ODFW document Trends in Cougar Mortality attached to my email. Ground breaking research conducted for decades by the Washington State Carnivore Laboratory demonstrates that increased and indiscriminate cougar killing increases the risk of conflicts because it disrupts the social system and age/sex ratio of the populations. Removal of established adult cats results in the immigration of juveniles, the age group responsible for causing conflicts with livestock, people and pets. My email message includes links to this research, including peer reviewed published articles. Without compelling reasons to increase cougar mortality and especially hunting mortality, we believe it is inappropriate to do so given the risk of creating or exacerbating conflicts, as evidenced by results of this extensive body of field research.

The justifications for increasing the quotas provided in the proposal are open to question. The population estimates and non-hunt mortality objectives used to justify the increase in quotas relate to the Oregon Cougar Management Plan that received significant scientific criticism.

The model used to generate the population estimates used in the proposal were developed by the 2006 Cougar Management Plan which was criticized and discredited by well known biologists during limited peer review. I have attached

some of those comments to my email. The new population model promised by ODFW has been in the works for several years, but is yet to be produced or utilized.

From a practical standpoint, it seems highly unlikely that the cougar population has increased at a rate of over 5% yearly and doubled in size in 19 years. This is especially difficult to believe in light of the concerns that deer and elk populations are below Management Objectives as indicated in the proposal. How could the cougar population grow so robustly when their food source is in jeopardy?

All objectives of the Cougar Management Plan are based on benchmarks from 1994 and all support the plan's main design to allow cougar mortality to increase all the way up to the point where the population reaches or falls below the level it was estimated at in 1994. When the model shows an ever-growing population, the mortality margin or kill quota increases significantly every year.

Objective 2 states that when non-hunt mortality is more than what it was in 1994, administrative removal may be implemented. Administrative removal means that agents of ODFW or USDA's Wildlife Services, or hunters representing ODFW enter a geographic 'target area' within a zone and indiscriminately kill unlimited cougars using hounds, traps, snares. The non-hunt mortality number (the number of cougars killed for damage, public safety etc.,) has risen since 1994 in most zones of the state as our population has increased and expanded into the countryside, and technology has improved. So there is hardly a zone left in the state where that number is not above 1994 levels and hence there is possibility of administrative implementation anywhere in Oregon.

Currently there have been a total of 7 target areas where administrative removal has been implemented, resulting in the killing of at least 350 cats. Only 2 out of the 7 areas were 'treated' to address conflicts related to safety or damage, the other 5 were located in prime hunting zones to boost elk and deer numbers for the benefit of hunters. Objective 5 allows administrative removal where 1994 management objectives for elk and deer are not met.

We object to the proposal's increase in quotas because we see no reason for them, except to allow more hunting in Zone A. And we object to the reference to Objective 2 non-hunt mortality as a means to pave the way for implementation of more target areas. Increasing cougar mortality is not only detrimental to cougars; it increases the risk of conflicts with people. We urge you to more carefully research this proposal and take it under consideration at a later time.

Dear Chair Levy and Commissioners:

On behalf of the Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) and our supporters in Oregon, I reiterate our strong opposition to the "Siskiyou Plus" Spring bear hunt, which ODFW has proposed to expand to the southwestern portion of Oregon by 250 tags, in addition to the 4,400 bear tags already available.

It is our position that like hounding and baiting - practices banned by Oregon voters - Spring bear hunting is unethical, inhumane, and unsporting. The practice of killing nursing mother bears results in orphaned cubs, who die from starvation, predation, or exposure. In addition, bears are physically stressed and vulnerable in the Spring, as they are just emerging from the den after months of not eating. In contrast to traditional hunting methods, this places them at a distinct and unfair disadvantage.

We urge the Commission to align itself with the values of the overwhelming majority of Oregonians, who want all wildlife, including predators, managed in a manner that is respectful, humane, and scientifically sound. Expanding Spring bear hunting is in direct conflict with those values. Please **REJECT** the "Siskiyou Plus" Spring bear hunt.

Washington State has legalized the use of Lighted Nocks. The lighted nock in no way makes it any easier to shoot an Animal. It may only help in the recovery of an animal after the shot, i.e., either helping to recover the animal or seeing where the arrow hit the animal. The speed of modern bows and smaller sizes of arrows makes it extremely hard to impossible to see arrow flight.

This all revolves around ethics. How long do we wait after the shot? Our arrow will let us know.

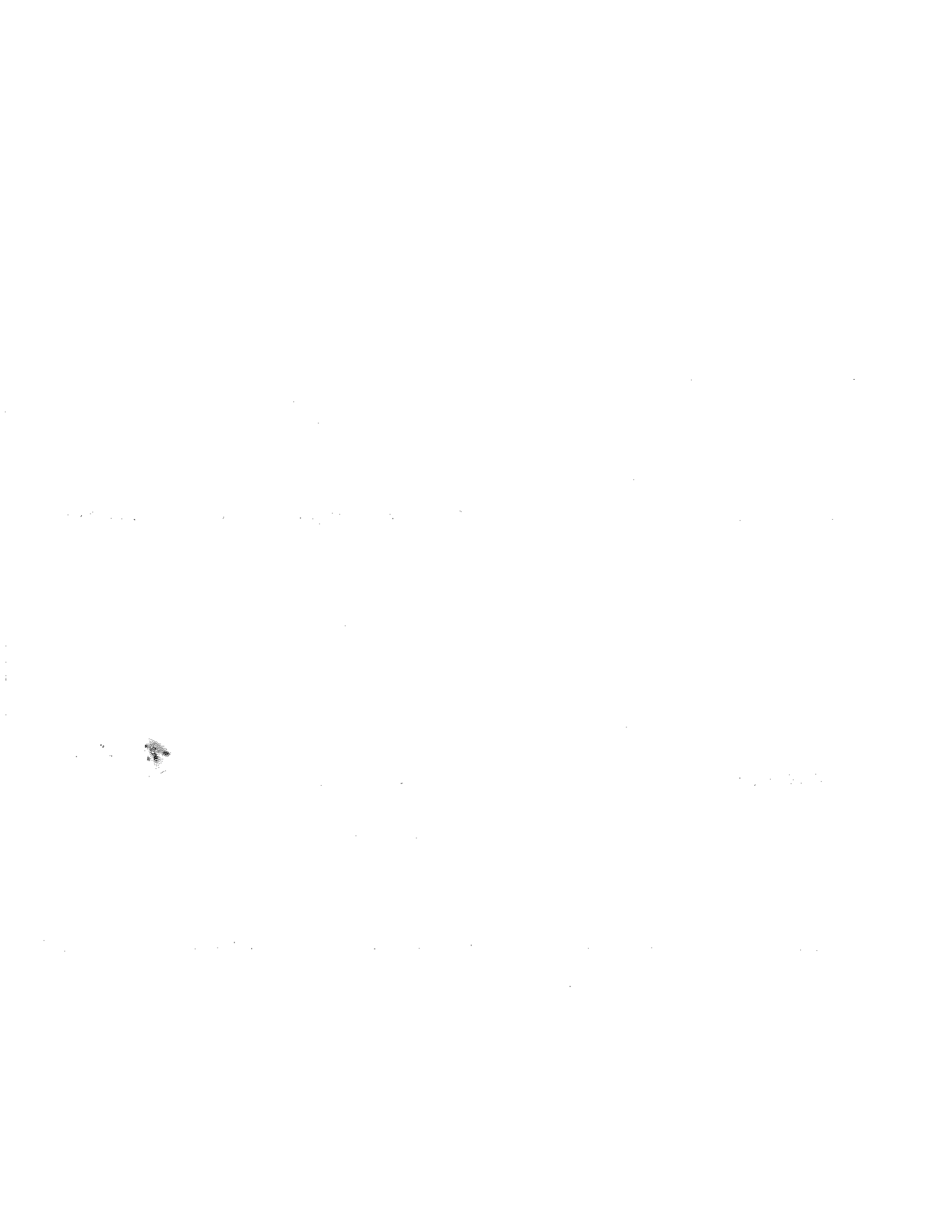
