RE: Uplist the Marbled Murrelets to Endangered and approve mandatory Marbled Murrelet survival guidelines

Dear Commissioners:

As a coastal resident and small woodlot owner, I ask you to again re-visit your vote to not better protect marbled murrelet. Without your action to uplist them, marbled murrelet will likely go extinct in Oregon during my lifetime and definitely within my 2 year old son's. Of all times, Oregon needs to lead today, not lag in environmental protections.

I attended and provided testimony regarding the uplisting of marbled murrelet at your February meeting in Portland. I was elated at the Commission's leadership, voting after several presentation and hours of testimony to better protect the elusive seabird that is reliant on our increasingly scarce late successional/old growth forests. I learned later that a few Commissioners changed at the June meeting and those Commissioners, who didn't hear us, and Commissioner Webber, tipped the vote the other direction.

Without a change, I will watch logging trucks continue to pass my house with only six very large trees on them, coming from Oregon's Clatsop and Tillamook State Forests. I will hike through overstocked tree farms rather than natural forest as State Parks & Recreation will continue to not actively restore Ecola and Oswald West State Parks' forests (among other coastal parks) to speed up more natural forest structure. Private timber owners, TIMOs and REITs will continue to bend every rule until all their larger trees are gone. Oregon will not provide leadership, but will lag behind Washington and California on needed protections.

You have all the science needed to decide that it is better to act now than not. The Marbled Murrelet Status Review Report provided justification for uplisting based on decades of scientific evidence. It showed that what we have done so far is not enough to stem their steep decline.

At the August meeting, please uplist the Marbled Murrelet to Endangered and approve mandatory (not voluntary) Marbled Murrelet survival guidelines consistent with those originally provided by ODFW staff at the June meeting. We need protection of all high quality suitable Marbled Murrelet nesting habitat. Thank you.

Where is the science in that reversal? As a career wildlife biologist, I am convinced beyond a doubt that this species is in serious decline in our region. You are morally and perhaps legally obligated to avoid further loss of nesting habitat, occupied as well as areas with a high probability of being potentially suitable.

Moreover, decades of experience elsewhere have shown that voluntary (as opposed to mandatory) conservation guidelines, which already are inadequate for this species, are routinely ignored by many timber companies. Compliance with Oregon's should be mandatory and enforcement vigorous.

ODFW Commissioners,

The last time I looked the ODFW's mission statement proclaimed that commissioners will "protect and enhance fish and wildlife and their habitat. Are you still abiding by that statement? If so, it is very difficult to reconcile with your backtracking on the "endangered" listing of the marbled murrelet. The best available science shows that these birds are in decline and may become extinct here in Oregon if more effort isn't made to protect their habitat.

In an article for the Daily Astorian, Commissioner Buckmaster said that he didn't support the "endangered" listing of the murrelet because he thought it might result in harm to the timber industry. My guess is that his statement reflects the consensus opinion on the Commission. Sadly, Commissioner Buckmaster's position suggests a lack of understanding of the bird and the current levels of timber management on the north coast of Oregon.

The murrelet nests in old growth, or trees of roughly 100 plus years in age by current standards. The Oregon Department of Forestry estimates that Oregon has only one tenth of one percent of old growth remaining. In Commissioner Buckmaster's county (Clatsop) that amounts to a few isolated groves primarily on state forest land that could at most amount to a few thousand acres if the definition of old growth is extended to included trees of 80 years and older. Groves of that nature are approaching mature forest that may attract murrelets in the absence of true old growth.

Here's the rub. Clatsop County has 500,000 acres of forested land, the bulk of which is owned by private timber companies. The fraction on state land that could be taken off the table for the sake of the murrelets survival doesn't amount to a significant decline in harvest or monies directed to the counties from that activity. So what is the reason to claim the listing of the bird could hurt the timber industry?

In recent years the timber companies have been pushing for a reduction of conservation zones established by the ODF. The reason is that due to rates of harvest that are unsustainable, they have run out of larger trees to harvest so they are pushing the ODF to put

more mature trees (conservation zones) up for sale. The timber companies interest in getting at those older trees is also behind their support of the Linn County Timber lawsuit.

By declining to list the murrelet as “endangered” the ODFW demonstrates that the Commission has in effect become a shill of the timber industry. Those of us who champion balanced forest management which includes protection of endangered species are extremely disappointed with the ODFW.

Hello,

Recently I have learned that little care and effort has been given to protect a small forest nesting seabird, the Marbled Murrelet. Now it's not everyone nor every wildlife organization ignoring or being slow to respond, it's just a few and it's the few that matter.

To end this slow response to protect this bird, please vote to uplist the marbled murrelet from threatened to endangered under Oregon's Endangered Species Act.

The draft status review to uplist marbled murrelet to endangered under state law indicates that the marbled murrelet is in danger of extinction in Oregon in this century. Loss and fragmentation of old growth nesting habitat and other impacts have led to a historically low population size, an untenably low reproductive rate and demographics that strongly suggest a high probability of extinction.

Habitat loss and fragmentation from logging in high quality murrelet nesting habitat is a major factor in this species' ongoing decline, and current timber harvest management and regulations are exacerbating the problem. In particular, logging of prime murrelet habitat on non-federal land has continued at an alarmingly high rate over the past 25 years.

Oregon has no comprehensive murrelet conservation strategy on state land, which contains significant remaining murrelet nesting habitat. An uplisting would make this a requirement and set in motion survival guidelines for the species. Without a road map for recovery on state lands, efforts to bring this species back from the brink will continue to fail.

The ecological and policy factors detailed in the status review clearly meet the criteria to uplist this species from threatened to endangered.

Please vote to uplist marbled murrelet and give them a chance for survival in Oregon.

I am writing to express my deep concern regarding the misinformed and inappropriate decision the ODFW Commission made at the June 7th meeting in reversing their decision to uplist the Marbled Murrelet from threatened to endangered under Oregon's Endangered Species Act.

The status review not only provided ample justification for uplisting based on decades of scientific evidence, but it also clearly documented an accelerated rate of logging on state lands since the Marbled Murrelet was originally listed back in the 1990s as well as demonstrating that existing state programs and regulations are inadequate to protect the species or its habitat.

I remind you that you work for the people of this state, to protect those ones without voices, and to ensure that generations to come will have a habitable planet on which to live.

At the August 3rd meeting, your job is to follow the mission of the Dept. of Fish and Wildlife, not to cave in to timber lobby interests to extract forest resources.

- * Follow through on uplisting the Marbled Murrelets to Endangered status and to approve mandatory (not voluntary) Marbled Murrelet survival guidelines consistent with those originally provided by ODFW staff at the June 2018 meeting.
- * Require land-managing agencies to adopt the Pacific Seabird Group Protocol as the "Approved survey" for monitoring state forest lands for murrelet occupancy, presence, and potential absence.
- * Require protection of all high quality suitable Marbled Murrelet nesting habitat (both occupied and unoccupied).

Only such mandatory, enforceable guidelines will help provide strong protections for Marbled Murrelets AND THEIR HABITAT of mature and Old Growth Forests, that may save us from our own destructive behaviors. These actions will also help the species recover from a historically low population and a high probability of extinction in Oregon.

Re: Comments on Draft Advisory Survival Guidelines for Marbled Murrelet

Dear Chair Finley and Members of the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission:

We are troubled by the lack of due process associated with your decision to not uplist the Marbled Murrelet. While we strongly oppose the Commission's decision during the June 7th meeting to reverse its vote on uplisting the species, there remains an urgent need to protect Marbled Murrelets from further decline. We are therefore submitting for the public record these written comments outlining our concerns and suggestions for the adoption of mandatory survival guidelines for Marbled Murrelets.

1) Advisory survival guidelines do not meet the letter and intent of the Oregon Endangered Species Act and should instead be adopted as mandatory.

The draft survival guidelines presented by Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) staff in June contained meaningful provisions to ensure the recovery of Marbled Murrelets. However, the latest draft provided by ODFW staff for consideration by the Commission in August has been significantly weakened. The proposed guidelines are now "advisory" and unenforceable. This undermines both the letter and the intent of the Oregon Endangered Species Act (OESA). The OESA requires that the Commission adopt by rule quantifiable and measurable survival guidelines that it considers necessary to ensure the survival of individual members of the species (ORS 496.182 and OAR 635-100-0130). We urge the Commission to adopt mandatory survival guidelines for Marbled Murrelets – as intended and required by the OESA – through a fair and transparent public process.

2) The draft Advisory Survival Guidelines for Marbled Murrelet are not enforceable and do not encourage inter-agency collaboration.

In the current version of the guidelines, ODFW shrugs off responsibility for implementing, monitoring and enforcing murrelet conservation measures. As a species on the OESA, ODFW has a clear statutory obligation to ensure Marbled Murrelet populations and their habitat is protected in Oregon, especially on state lands. This is a matter of public concern and why we are asking that the guidelines should be mandatory, monitored and enforced by ODFW instead of being voluntary measures undertaken by USFWS and Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF) on state and other public lands. Based on past behavior, we do not have faith in ODF's ability or willingness to enforce such measures if they remain voluntary.

3) The survival guidelines should be put into immediate effect.

The survival guidelines do not kick in until 2020. Two years is a long waiting period for a population that is already small in size and at risk of extinction¹. Survival guidelines are intended to be temporary measures preventing any further loss of individual members of the species. We urge that the guidelines be put into immediate effect.

4) The survival guidelines should adopt the survey methodology developed by the Pacific Seabird Group.

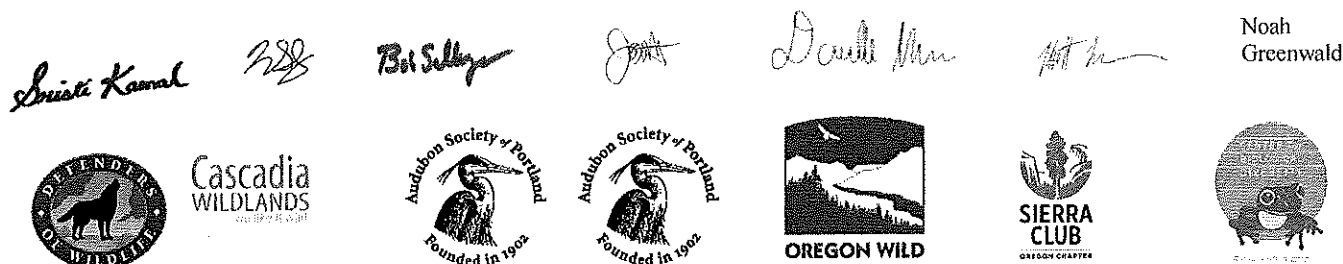
The survival guidelines should specify the Pacific Seabird Group (PSG)'s survey method as the "approved survey" method. It is a science-based consensus effort and the PSG updates the protocol periodically based on new scientific information, which makes it very pragmatic and adaptable. In particular, in years of poor at-sea forage conditions, the minimum consecutive years a site should be surveyed prior to consideration of tree removal should be 5 consecutive years (rather than 2 years). No other murrelet survey method exists with the rigor and scientific vetting that the PSG protocol provides.

5) The survival guidelines should provide clear prohibitions on logging in occupied areas and buffer zones.

Once an occupied site is identified on state lands, then the rules should be patently clear that by default logging is prohibited in the occupied areas and buffers. The language in the current version of the guidelines is vague and ambiguous in places, which will likely lead to interpretation disputes and more work for both ODFW and land-owning agencies. For example, 7 (a) to 7 (d) lists out prohibited actions in occupied or buffer areas (including use of chainsaws and heavy equipment) but does not state "logging" in any of the clauses. Also, 6(c) in the current draft states, "Projects that remove trees shall be prohibited in occupied sites and buffers to the extent that habitat function is changed for Marbled Murrelets" where "extent that habitat function is changed" is very subjective and therefore difficult to assess.

We are deeply concerned by the Commission's rejection of science and its disregard of fair, transparent, public processes when it comes to conserving our state's imperiled species. We hope that adopting survival guidelines, the Commission will be able to use fair judgement, follow due process and pass mandatory survival guidelines to protect Marbled Murrelet in Oregon.

In order to prevent the Marten from becoming extinct, please prohibit all mammal trapping in the Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area and prohibit Marten trapping in the Siskiyou and Siuslaw National Forests.

Dear ODFW Commissioner,

In February 2018, I joined Portland Audubon and many other concerned Oregonians in asking that the ODFW Commission uplist the conservation status of the Marbled Murrelet from threatened to endangered under Oregon's Endangered Species Act.

It was my sincere hope that uplisting under the ESA would inspire a new era of integrated policy-making that would better insure the survival of this bellwether seabird while also enhancing the health of forest and ocean habitat that it shares with so many other species.

Today I am writing to express my deep dismay over how, at its June 2018 meeting in Baker City, the ODFW Commission:

- 1) Reversed its February 2018 decision to uplist the Marbled Murrelet from threatened to endangered.
- 2) Will subsequently now delay the approval of mandatory survival guidelines as recommended by ODFW Staff at that June 2018 meeting.

I am particularly alarmed:

- 1) That the Commission would ignore decades of scientific evidence as compiled by ODFW Staff in its Marbled Murrelet Status Review Report.
- 2) That the Commission would ignore the accelerated rate of logging on state lands as well as logging practices that fall far short of sustaining critical habitat for the Marbled Murrelet.

Yes, jobs matter, and community input, including that of the timber industry, should be part of any constructive discussion regarding the finer points of mandatory Marbled Murrelet survival guidelines.

But does the ODFW Commission have a plan for evolving sound forestry practices that meet the needs of the evermore ecologically-challenged era that surely lies ahead?

Does it have a plan for revitalizing the economies of our rural communities in ways that best serve the land-base and the local cultures of those regions?

I imagine not, since such projects are not directly under its aegis, but instead are the responsibility of other state agencies and our Oregon Legislature.

That said, I am urging the ODFW Commission to:

- 1) Reconfirm your decision of February 2018 by uplisting the Marbled Murrelet from threatened to endangered at the ODFW Commission meeting on August 3rd.
- 2) Approve mandatory Marbled Murrelet survival guidelines consistent with those already provided by ODFW Staff.
- 3) Require that state land-managing agencies adopt the Pacific Seabird Group Protocol as the standard for monitoring state forest lands while assessing the status of Marbled Murrelet populations.
- 4) Require effective protection of high quality Marbled Murrelet nesting habitat, occupied and unoccupied.

In a time of great ecological disruption, we should seriously rethink conventional modes of wildlife management and the role that state lands will have to play in securing environmental sanity and biological stability for all our relations. The transition may prove difficult work, but without such a change, future generations of Oregonians will surely be yoked with a far more daunting task.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit comments on the Commission's consideration of advisory survival guidelines for the Marbled Murrelet. My name is Cameron Krauss and I represent Seneca Sawmill Company, Seneca Jones Timber Company, and Seneca Sustainable Energy. Collectively, Seneca operates four (4) sawmills, one renewable energy facility, and manages over 167,000 acres, primarily in Coos, Lane, and Douglas County Oregon. All told, Seneca directly employs about 450 individuals.

By way of this letter, Seneca supports the comments of the Oregon Forests & Industries Council.

With that, I would like to make a few comments on the process that the Commission used to respond to the uplist petition, the response of petitioners, and most troubling, some material included in your packets today. I appreciate that upon examination of the full record in this proceeding that the Commission was able to weigh the pros and cons of an uplisting and make a

sound decision based on facts and science. Clearly, the murrelet population and habitat trends in Oregon do not support an uplisting from threatened to endangered. The Commission made a reasoned decision.

Following your meeting in Baker City, I read many articles and news stories that contained hostile comments from the petitioners. The petitioners are plainly misstating the facts. It almost appears that the petitioners in this case are rooting against the murrelet population and habitat trends. One must question their motives.

Even more troubling, the Pacific Seabird Group (PSG) —a nonregulatory body comprised of volunteers that developed many of the management measures we see in ODF&W's draft survival guidelines—now appears to have stepped out of its role as a neutral, science and fact-based advisory group and into the role of an advocacy organization actively seeking to discredit actual survey data on murrelet populations, our elected officials, and this Commission. This "independent" group has publicly stated that they worked with the petitioners to submit this letter. This was apparently done by a subset of the PSG group with little involvement or oversight. The letter, the approach taken, and the fact that the PSG group coordinated with petitioners call into question the PSG and anything in which it is involved. As a landowner, public timber purchaser, and employer of hundreds of families, we count on independence and honesty from regulators and the scientific community. In this case, it appears that we simply cannot do that. If the PSG is really an advocacy group simply opposed to active forest management, then all of their work—including the management measures in their survey protocol that formed the basis for the draft survival guidelines before you—should be questioned.

Submitted to the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission for its Public Hearing on August 3, 2018 to consider:

Endangered Status of the Marbled Murrelet (*Brachyramphus marmoratus*) and Action on survival guidelines to prevent extinction and recover the species under the state Endangered Species Act

To the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission, I urge the following action to ensure the survival of the Marbled Murrelet (*Brachyramphus marmoratus*) :

- Follow through on your February commitment to uplist the Marbled Murrelet to Endangered under the Oregon Endangered Species Act. That decision was predicated on the science compiled in the ODFW Staff's *Marbled Murrelet Status Review Report.
- Adopt survival guidelines that follow those originally provided by ODFW staff at the June 2018 meeting with the following amendments that: Require land-managing agencies to adopt the Pacific Seabird Group Protocol as the "Approved survey" for monitoring state forest lands for murrelet occupancy, presence, and potential absence and require protection of all high quality suitable Marbled Murrelet nesting habitat (both occupied and unoccupied).
- Adopt mandatory (not voluntary) survival guidelines for the Marbled Murrelet. It is important to implement enforceable guidelines that ensure land-managing agencies provide protections for murrelets and their habitat that will help the species recover.

***ODFW staff report:**

"The likelihood of survival of the species has diminished such that the species is in danger of extinction throughout a significant portion of its range within Oregon.

Not just one necessary factor, which would suffice, but all three of the following factors exist to warrant uplisting:

- 1) Most populations of the species are undergoing imminent or active deterioration of their range or primary habitat;

- 2) Overutilization of the species or its habitat for commercial, recreational, scientific, or educational purposes is occurring or is likely to occur;
- 3) Existing state or federal programs or regulations are inadequate to protect the species and its habitat."

Further Background:

*"The Marbled Murrelet, a small seabird, breeds along the Pacific Coast from Alaska to central California. Marbled Murrelets spend most of their lives in marine waters and forage at sea on small fish and invertebrates. Throughout much of their range, they fly inland for nesting in old growth and late-successional forests. " All supporting habitat conditions are at risk -- land and sea, as supported by the ODFW Staff report.

The campaign to ensure the survival of this species has been a valiant effort and pursuit by committed professional MAMU researchers and volunteer citizen science witnesses. The original MAMU listing petition, based on the status review of the late David B. Marshall and submitted by the Audubon Society of Portland et al., led to the Federal ESA listing in 1992 and the Threatened Oregon ESA listing in 1995. With the current listing of state Endangered status in both Washington and California, the habitat gap in needed protection efforts, e.g., logging on Federal, State and yes, private lands, cannot be ignored, as well as troubling ocean conditions, e.g, ocean climatic warming with loss of prey base in addition to adverse impacts from oil spills and infusion of plastic debris.

Final Plea

- Confirm the Endangered Species listing for the Marbled Murrelet, based on supporting evidence in the ODFW Staff report and that supplied by petitioners.
- Adopt mandatory survival guidelines for the Marbled Murrelet, as outlined above, to follow the Pacific Seabird Group protocol.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment once again on Survival Guidelines for the Marbled Murrelet, and by extension your status determination for the species.

After your February 9th determination that the Marbled Murrelet warranted uplisting to endangered status (see meeting minutes, Attachment 4, 635-100-0125 State List of Threatened and Endangered Species), ODFW staff accomplished exemplary work in producing survival guidelines that according to your announcement for the upcoming August 9th meeting "...the Commission considers necessary to ensure the survival of individual members of the species (ORS496.182(2)(a); OAR 635-100-0100(13))[emphasis added]." Adopting these as advisory only is counter to your responsibility to provide necessary guidelines to ensure survival of individuals.

I find it extraordinary that the Commission, after using scientific findings in order to recommend uplisting, chose at its June 7th meeting to ignore its own determination, and instead rely on politically motivated testimony to reverse its earlier decision. The Commission was directed towards this reversal by an unprecedented reinterpretation of

procedure by Director Melcher that the Commission has the authority to withdraw its uplisting recommendation, based on no new or established facts.

Under both the federal and Oregon ESA, status determinations are to be made based on established fact, not on supposition or on potential future scientific findings. Cited often, the current OSU College of Forestry study presented to you in February by 3 of its 4 principal investigators will, at the end of its projected 10 year period, provide no direct demographic or population-based information which could inform a future status review. If successful, it should provide relevant information on murrelet biology, energetics, predation, and nest site selection. Commission members present in February had considerable time in which to ask if any results would inform them on future population determinations.

I am greatly concerned that evidence indicates that political motivations drove the Commission to withdraw a properly reached status determination for the marbled murrelet. If the decision reversal remains unchallenged, it will set a precedent for future species status determinations to be influenced by hearsay and conjecture rather than fact.

We now have yet another species sliding down the slope towards extinction. Even if marbled murrelets are caught on a ledge before another period of decline is clear, the role of the Commission and its Department is to cast a rescue rope, and at least hold on to the near end if they are not going to pull.

I urge you to withdraw the Commission reversal on status determination, in that the marbled murrelet warrants uplisting to endangered status. I also urge you to adopt mandatory survival guidelines and rules, as developed by Department staff that will be subject to scientific and public review.

In many cases these areas have older decadent timber that is best converted to healthy young stands. As a small woodland owner of 71 acres just 42 miles from the coast in the hills north of Sheridan and Willamina, your decisions do impact my ability to carry on the work of my late husband. He spent fifteen years developing Crowncrest Tree Farm, planting, along with the family, about 2000 trees each year, beginning in 1978. Over the years we have been able to harvest twice and thin again about three years ago. Wildlife seem to enjoy our forest - deer, elk, coyotes, bear, even a cougar, and more, wander through.

As your work continues to provide guidance for the survival of the Marbled Murrelet, I hope you will consider the survival of small woodlands such as ours. My husband was a land surveyor for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and I was a Realty Specialist for the Bureau of Land Management. It is my understanding that the Marbled Murrelet populations in Oregon are stable and increasing. Dear Mr. Finley – I write in reference to the Marbled Murrelets in Oregon.

I am a small family forest owner and manage my forest under best practices as outlined by the Oregon Department of Forestry. My property is within a few hundred feet of the Pacific Ocean in southern Oregon.

First I wish to thank you for the Commission's decision on June 7, 2018 to NOT uplist the Marbled Murrelet based on the most recent surveys and recent science.

I would encourage you to stand with that decision. If your commission decides to once again list the Marbled Murrelet as Endangered it could have potential adverse impacts on my property for years to come. Once a species becomes "endangered" all sorts of restrictions come in to play which may in fact prohibit me (and my children or grandchildren) from ever logging my property again. The forestry department and land use commissions want to keep resource property tied up to be used only as resource property but then when something like this comes along it has the potential to take that resource property and essentially lock it up so that it is no longer able to be utilized as resource property. The property would still be classified as resource property but really would not be if these overly restrictive regulations come in to play. So even re-considering the Marbled Murrelet to be endangered could essentially strip thousands of acres of forest land out of use as resource property.

I urge you to strongly favor the US Fish and Wildlife Marbled Murrelet surveys over that last 15 or so years that show that the populations in Oregon are stable and in fact increasing. The surveys, as I understand it, follow scientifically approved protocols and are statistically valid.

I would encourage you, when considering the Voluntary Survival Guidelines for Marbled Murrelets that you follow science. If any part of the guidelines do not follow the science then it renders the entire guideline null and void. I urge you to base the entire guideline on true science and not just someone's emotional whim that they think will be best. Emotions should play no part in coming up with these guidelines. They should be based 100% on fact and science.

If overly restrictive practices become part of the "Voluntary" guidelines then it causes dis-incentive for the forest owner to follow them at all. The best guidelines should provide practices that will create incentives for forest owners such as myself to do things that benefit Marbled Murrelets. I encourage you to not penalize forest owners but instead the guidelines should encourage them to do things that might help the Murrelet recover even stronger.

Please consider only the valid science and surveys and not the emotions that might come in to play.

The Lane County Board of Commissioners previously submitted comment to the Commission on June 4 regarding the uplisting of the Marbled Murrelet as well as specific comments on the Draft Survival Guidelines posted at that time. I write today to thank the Commission for their action to rescind their previous decision to uplist the Marbled Murrelet, and to recognize the proposed Administrative Rules to be discussed during the August 3rd meeting are now purely advisory with respect to actions State agencies may take in areas that are suitable habitat or occupied sites.

With this said, however, I want to reiterate comment that the Board of Commissioners did make in our June 4 letter, as I note the Commission did not change the definition of suitable habitat:

- We find the definition of "suitable habitat" to be an important element of this plan, and in particular the definition indicates a 35 mile from sea as an implied inland boundary. However, we note the Review indicated that all nests found to date in Oregon have been within 30 miles of the sea. We would recommend that the definition be modified downward to 30 miles as a result.

Thank you for including this testimony into the record.

Subject: Comment on Marbled Murrelet Voluntary Survival Guidelines and attempts to reverse ODF&W decision to not uplift

Having conducted hundreds of environmental studies over my 45-year career as a registered professional engineer, I know the high standards required of credible scientific research. I recently testified to the Board of Forestry, regarding the Oregon Department of Forestry's incomplete and seriously flawed Ripstream fieldwork, that seriously violated prevailing scientific procedures and protocol in many ways. ODF also chose to ignore numerous prior and ongoing headwater studies, that were both rigorous and comprehensive, and instead focused on trying to salvage something from its own seriously flawed Ripstream fieldwork. The points made in my 2015 Ripstream testimony have been thoroughly corroborated, most recently by OSU's 2018 study* showing that groundwater is a more important determinant in headwater stream temperature than is stream buffer width. I trust that the Ripstream exercise taught ODF some valuable lessons about rushing to judgement before there is a solid scientific basis, particularly before making a regulatory change. I think the ODF&W Commission can also learn lessons from the flawed Ripstream process.

I am also a second generation family forest owner, and am concerned about the potential impact of the Marbled Murrelet decision on property that my family has sustainably managed for years. The proposal to uplift the Murrelet runs counter to The US Fish & Wildlife credible studies, which showed that Murrelet populations are actually stable and increasing. I appreciate that ODF&W relied on this credible source in their June 7th decision not to uplift the Murrelet.

I am quite concerned about the lack of a scientific basis for the Voluntary Survival Guidelines as well as the recent push by certain parties to force the ODF&W Commission to reverse its decision and instead uplift the Murrelet. Such a rush to judgement is clearly an attempt to take private property without a solid scientific basis. Please don't allow this to happen.

I appreciate that you read every email or letter sent to you. I'm a timber owner with properties on Coast Range slopes and I am concerned about a more restrictive change in marbled murrelet status. The marbled murrelet can fly anywhere--and they are quite the long-distance flyer!--but I can't move my trees. I'm encouraging you to hold fast to science and wait for the soon forthcoming study results. Protecting them is not a dire, immediate crisis as some believe.

At this time there is negligible need for Voluntary Survival Guidelines. There will be time enough to re-evaluate after the study is completed. Haste makes waste, and I think the waste will affect me and other timberland owners and not any of the self-labeled environmentalists. Furthermore, once certain groups feel they've got one step up on the ladder to up-lifting, they will not stop.

My husband and I work on our timber properties almost every single day! We keep a close eye on our trees, insects, birds, animals from ticks to cougars, and invasive species. We invest thousands of dollars and lots of time to control invasives and provide appropriate habitat. We are the true environmentalists. We will be willing to protect murrelet habitat if and when it is deemed scientifically beneficial.

Dear Mr. Finley:

Thank you for taking the time to thoughtfully consider all of the relevant information regarding this species prior to making your decision. As you saw, the latest federal scientific populations' data shows a statistically significant improvement in the population over more than a decade here in Oregon. As an Oregonian, Coastal resident and Forester who cares about these issues; thanks for your hard work on this one, and making the right call after weighing all the information.

The survival guidelines should be reworked to eliminate all notions towards protection or consultation with ODFW, and instead point agencies towards federal ESA recommendations and consultation with USFWS. This information is more robust and is the most prudent path for natural resource agencies.

Throughout the document the term "survival guidelines" is used, this should be changed to "advisory survival guidelines".


I am not a scientist however, we Foresters pride ourselves on using the best available science to perform our work. With this in mind, here are a few points of the Draft Advisory Survival Guidelines that are not supported by science:

1. In section 6(a) the guidelines mention protecting sites where subcanopy behaviors have been detected. According to Plissner et al (2015) not all subcanopy behaviors have been strongly connected with known nesting. Notably, Jet dives, a subcanopy behavior, was not considered to be strongly connected with known nests. Also noted by Plissner et al was the problem with defining circling as a behavior. No literature defines the amount of arc necessary to define circling vs simple course correction. The utility of "subcanopy behaviors" as a strong predictor of occupancy is fundamentally flawed and highly problematic. For these reasons we strongly encourage any advisory guideline protection be connected with known nest sites.
2. Section 6(a) also suggests protection for "all continuous suitable habitat in a project area". This too is not well supported by science and will likely lead to drastic overreach and restrictions to areas having little to no influence on mamu. This goes beyond protection of "individual members of the species", the stated purpose for survival guidelines under ORS 496.182(2)(a). We suggest removing the reference to protection for "all continuous suitable habitat in the project area".
3. Section 7(a) discusses restrictions on the use of chainsaws and heavy equipment within buffers, this is also not supported in published literature, and likely depends on a host of specific factors,

- such as the type of chainsaw (electric for example) or the location of the buffer (over a ridge for example). We suggest removing this highly speculative and unsupported guideline.
4. Section 7(c) places restrictions of 1 mile on the use of explosives. This too is not documented in research, and the distance applied here of 1 mile is pure speculation. In reality it is highly likely that the use of explosives as an agent for disturbing nesting mamu depends on the type, amount and frequency of explosives, as well as environmental factors such as aspect and topography > For example, there could be a mountain in between the occupied site and the explosive. This particular guideline should not be included, or at best should be changed to delete the arbitrary notion of a 1-mile distance and instead recommend expert biologists be consulted.
 5. Under the definition of "Platform" the document references a "*flat surface on a tree limb, which is generally ≥ 4 inches in diameter*". In Oregon the mean diameter of known platforms is 10 inches, with a standard deviation of 4 inches. We therefore suggest changing this reference to ≥ 6 inches in diameter, as this more accurately reflects empirical data and accounts for 95% of the variability.
 6. Under the definition of "Platform tree" the document references equal to platforms being generally at least "*33 feet high in a live coniferous tree*". In Oregon the mean height above the ground for nest sites has been documented as being 118 feet, with a standard deviation of 46 feet. Therefore, we suggest changing this reference to generally at least 72 feet above the ground, as this more accurately reflects empirical data.
 7. Under the definition of "Project Area" the document references "*the geographic extent that will be directly affected by the proposed action, plus all continuous suitable habitat within 0.25 miles...*". The additional 0.25 miles is an overreach that is not documented in any empirical data and goes beyond protection of "individual members of the species", the stated purpose for survival guidelines under ORS 496.182(2)(a). We suggest removing the reference to 0.25 miles from the definition of Project Area.
 8. Under the definition of "Suitable Habitat" the document references "*old growth, mature, coniferous forest stands... within 35 miles*". 35 miles is too far. In Oregon there has been no mamu nests documented farther than 30 miles from the coast, with the mean being 14 miles. We strongly suggest reducing this number back to a scientifically relevant metric. With a mean of 14 and a standard deviation of 6, we suggest using 20 miles as this more appropriately accounts for 95% of known nesting within Oregon.

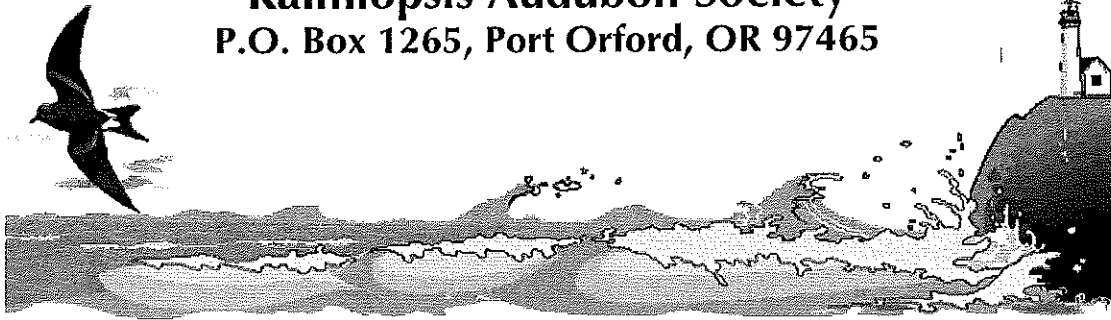

I am writing on behalf of the Kalmiopsis Audubon Society, which represents over 350 members in Curry County. Our members care deeply about the inherent benefits of preserving habitats for birds, fish, and wildlife. We are deeply concerned and discouraged that in your decision not to uplist the marbled murrelet you seemingly chose to be influenced by social, economic, and political pressures, rather than maintaining your focus on protecting and enhancing our wildlife for future generations. The letter you received from our Coastal Caucus of representatives mistakenly claimed that people on the coast don't care about marbled murrelets; however, we know our members and others in our coastal communities value the marbled murrelet and appreciate the unique species as a distinctive part of Oregon's coastal forest ecosystems. We have a decades-long history of protecting marbled murrelet habitat, and our organization continues to host annual trips for community members to learn about and view these rare and elusive birds. We recognize the marbled murrelet as an indicator of forest ecosystems that support clean, cold, salmon-filled rivers, rich soils, and resiliency in the face of drought, pests, fire, and flood.

It is not hard to find examples in history of managing agencies and wildlife commissions waiting to take protective action to recover a species only after it was too late. You have the opportunity *now* to take the proper actions to help move the marbled murrelet onto the road to recovery, and we urge you to do so. As you consider the adoption of the drafted survival guidelines, please remember that without uplisting and adopting mandatory guidelines your decision has essentially no practical application and will be unenforceable. Dear Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife Commissioner,

Dear ODFW Commissioner,

I am unable to attend the Marbled Murrelet (MAMU) hearing on Friday, August 3 in Salem so I am resubmitting this testimony (slightly updated) that was submitted at the February hearing. I'm a wildlife biologist who has held a USFWS 10(a)(1)(A) permit (TE 786728-5) to study Threatened and Endangered Wildlife for over three decades. Although I am an Oregon resident and tax payer, I have conducted protocol-level murrelet monitoring surveys at the southern limit of murrelet distribution in Zone 6, (the Santa Cruz Mountains of California) consecutively over the last 15 breeding seasons (2004-2018).

I am here to support uplisting the MAMU from threatened to endangered status following the lead of our immediate neighbors, California and Washington. In preparation for this hearing, I reviewed the January 2018 "Status Review for the Marbled Murrelet." It is a thoroughly researched document that contains a wealth of information. There is a lot of ambiguity in the evaluation of population trends based on modeling and imperfect survey techniques, as is to be expected when evaluating such a furtive and patchily distributed species, however it is clear from much of the quantifiable data that this species is in dire straits. These data include but are not limited to:

- o Extensive and ongoing habitat alteration and loss;
- o Increases in ocean temperatures and declines in productivity;
- o demographic data, such as low ratios of juveniles to adult birds counted at sea provide recent with productivity indices (0.025-0.060) that are an order of magnitude lower than what population models indicate is necessary to maintain stable populations (0.18-0.28).

For example: A recent assessment sensitivity to climate change by Case (2014) described the Marbled Murrelet as highly sensitive to climate change; of the 114 Pacific Northwest bird species analyzed, the murrelet had the highest climate-sensitivity score.

An additional comment: The murrelet survey protocols (Evans-Mach et al. 2003) to determine habitat occupancy require that intensive surveys to be conducted for at least two consecutive years. This is too short a time frame for such a long-lived species and for oceanic cycles that can extend for longer periods of time. We've seen in California, and I believe in Oregon over the past several years, that intervals of nesting efforts can exceed two-year intervals when ocean productivity is low.

Dear Commissioners,

In order for any guidelines to be useful, the Commission and Department need to commit time and resources (staff and funding) to working with other state agencies and the USFWS on implementation of the guidelines. On a regular basis such as annually, the Dept. should report to the Commission on what progress (or not) is being made by both other state agencies and ODFW in implementing guidelines. These guidelines should be updated regularly as needed and new information comes forward.

One of the statements in the draft guidelines seems out of place or incomplete. Under section (2)(3)(b) there is information on conservation of prey resources but there is no guideline per se relative to the marbled murrelet. The paragraph is just incidental information on programs that exist but are not really directed to address murrelet prey needs within state waters (3 mile limit). For example the marine reserves are nice to have but inadequate in size and distribution to significantly support murrelets since we are dealing with both a migratory bird and migratory fish. Perhaps a guideline like continue to support and conduct research to determine the status and availability of potential prey species along the Oregon coast relative to commercial harvest impacts. The intent is to make sure that adequate prey (whatever that is) populations are healthy and stable over time.

Honorable Commissioners:

My name is Glen Crouch. My wife and I own two tracts of forest land within a few miles of the beach in Lane and Tillamook Counties. We bought both tracts as cut over land and planted 12,000 trees on one, and 20,000 trees on the other. We did that in 1992 and 2000 as an investment for our retirement. We made several other investments including pre-commercial thinning of 25 acres and 17 acres on the Lane County tract and a current project involving 25 acres on the Tillamook County tract. Pre-commercial thinning means that the trees that are removed are not large enough to sell - it was an out-of-pocket expense but will encourage the larger trees to continue to grow rather than stagnate.

We feel confident that this has been a wise investment and that it will maintain us into our old age with a residual left to the kids.

We are very concerned about the Endangered Species Act and its potential for misuse by people that are opposed to human activity on rural land. Our lands are not pristine wilderness parcels. The Lane County property had been claimed as a homestead and cleared, and then essentially abandoned. It had grown up in timber and was logged in 1962. It was logged again in 1998 through 2000. We bought it subject to a timber deed. The Tillamook County parcel had previously belonged to Publishers Paper. It was logged in the 1940's, and again in 1990-1991.

You may not be aware of some of the ongoing research involving the marbled murrelet populations, their habitat needs and the burgeoning populations off British Columbia and southeast Alaska. The U. S. Fish & Wildlife has surveyed the murrelets and those studies are apparently scientifically valid. They show that the population is actually increasing.

Thank you for the Commission's scientifically supported decision not to uplist the marbled murrelet on June 7.

The new *Voluntary Survival Guidelines for Marbled Murrelets* should be written based on science and not based on popular opinion or fad. We are keen on doing all we can within physical and economic constraints of our situation. We trust that you will wisely write the practices in a manner that makes sense for the birds and for us, the property owners, and for the multitude of other species that reside on our property.

We remain mindful and grateful of the opportunity to own these interesting and economically rewarding forests. Yet we resent very much a heavy handed regulatory approach foisted upon us by members of society that have little or no knowledge of what we do or how the ecosystem works. Please choose to write your new rules with a soft hand in recognition of the fact that we are neither a "basket of deplorables" nor an ignorant bunch out here. While a carrot is often better than a switch, all we need is some advice as to what you would like to accomplish and, if it makes any economic sense, we will do it.

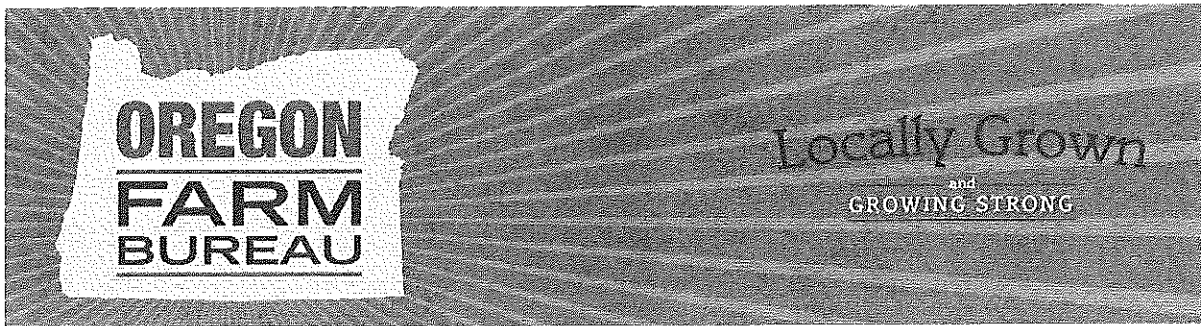

Dear Chair Finley and Members of the Commission,

The Oregon Farm Bureau Federation (OFB) appreciates the opportunity to provide comments on the adoption of “advisory” survival guidelines for the Marbled Murrelet (*Brachyramphus marmoratus*). As a reference, OFB is Oregon’s largest grassroots agriculture association, representing 7,000 farming and ranching families across the state. Our mission is to promote educational improvement, economic opportunity, and social advancement for our members and the farming, ranching, and natural resources industry.

We want to thank the Commission for the June decision not to up-list the Marbled Murrelet in the Oregon Endangered Species Act due to your thoughtful consideration of the overwhelming evidence demonstrating Marbled Murrelet populations are recovering in Oregon.

The Interagency Regional Monitoring Program by USFWS is highly rigorous and scientifically credible and their new data shows Marbled Murrelet populations are not only stable in Oregon but statistically on an upward trend from 2000 to 2017. The 2015 Oregon Legislature invested in a 10-year study to collect actual data on the Marbled Murrelet, which is only now underway. OFB asks that the Commission recognize improvements and begin to consider delisting the species.

OFB urges the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife Commission to consider a few changes to “advisory” survival guidelines for the Marbled Murrelet. These guidelines are advisory in nature, and that distinction should be made clearer. First, “Survival guidelines” should be changed to “advisory survival guidelines” throughout the document. Second, Section 6(a), the word “shall” should be changed to “should”. Finally, Section 6(c), second sentence reads “Exceptions to this rule may be allowed...”. The phrase “to this rule” should be removed, as this is not a mandatory rulemaking. These changes would help make the intent of the “advisory survival guidelines” more clear and easier for landowners to engage with.

Comments on Marbled Murrelet Reclassification and Adoption of Survival Guidelines

Dear Chair Finley and Fish and Wildlife Commissioners,

My name is Jenniffer Bakke and I am a Certified Wildlife Biologist® with an educational background in Forest Resources and Wildlife Science. My current position is as a Wildlife Biologist for Hancock Forest Management (HFM) with 15 years experience working within the intersection of forestry and wildlife, 11 of which have been with HFM. My entire career has been in western Oregon within the range of the marbled murrelet, first as a seasonal employee conducting murrelet surveys to now being responsible for implementation of state forest practice rule and federal Endangered Species Act compliance on private lands in Oregon. My professional credentials also include long-time membership in The Wildlife Society with 6 years service on the board of the Forestry & Wildlife Working Group. I am also a long-time member of the Oregon Chapter of The Wildlife Society and have served in many capacities on the board of that organization – most recently as past President. Furthermore, I am a member of the Pacific Seabird Group's (PSG) Marbled Murrelet Technical Committee. Membership of PSG is a prerequisite for serving on the PSG Inland Survey Protocol revision team, on which I serve as one of three industrial forestland representatives.

I commend the Commission for using the best available science related to marbled murrelet population trends in the decision to not reclassify the species as endangered. From my read of the statements and comments provided ahead of the Baker City meeting and also ahead of the upcoming August 3rd meeting in Salem, there are clearly passionate people with strongly-held beliefs about murrelet biology and the future of this species. As you have previously heard during testimony, this species is extremely difficult and expensive to study and thus, we do not have all the data we wish we did. You also heard several people testify that we should wait until the OSU study gets a little further along before drawing conclusions that contradict the population trend evidence presented by the Northwest Forest Plan Marbled Murrelet Effectiveness Monitoring Group (Pearson, et al., 2017 Summary Report). In fact, in a letter dated July 1, 2018 to the Commission, the PSG Conservation Committee claims that the data within the summary report contains limitations and was inappropriately interpreted. However, the population monitoring team does indeed acknowledge that adjustments were made to the trend analysis method to account for a reduced effort sampling design. While there are likely limitations to the confidence with which trend estimates can be generated, the Pearson Summary Report does in fact represent the best available science on the issue and the analysis indicates that Oregon murrelet population estimates are not trending downward.

I recognize that the upcoming Commission meeting is not the proper venue for discussing the decision to not reclassify the marbled murrelet as endangered, nor is it intended to discuss comments provided to you by the Pacific Seabird Group (PSG) or others. However, considering

that the Commission has already received the PSG Conservation Committee letter, I ask that as you move forward with adopting the Advisory Survival Guidelines, you consider the advocacy-driven nature of the letter – most notably that it was developed in conjunction with the Portland Audubon Society, one of the original petitioners in the 2016 petition to uplist. Furthermore, the letter demands significant policy changes, which I believe to be outside the scope of comments from a science-based professional organization.

Oregon's continued management of marbled murrelets relies on adoption of Advisory Survival Guidelines that are sufficient to meet the statutory obligations of the Commission and ODFW, complimentary to the federal ESA provisions already in place, and that are based on the best available science. I commend you for your efforts to date, and for making sound decisions based on the information at hand.

Dear Chair Finley and Members of the Commission,

In testimony before the Commission on June 7, 2018 I urged the Commission to carefully consider the best available current science and acknowledge ongoing research being conducted on Oregon Marbled murrelet populations, and conclude an uplist of the population status was not appropriate given information available to the Commission. The Commission is to be commended for its' thoughtful deliberation and decision based on the best available science and data to not uplist the bird.

On August 3, 2018 the Commission will consider new rules that outline Advisory Survival Guidelines for Oregon Marbled murrelets on lands owned or leased by a state agency. The Commission must again recognize and consider the best available science relevant to the Advisory Survival Guidelines.

Hampton Lumber owns and operates sawmills in northwest Oregon located in the communities of Warrenton, Tillamook, Willamina and Banks. Hampton sawmills in Oregon directly employ over 650 people with family wage jobs, and are the economic and social engines of their respective communities. The sawmills and the health of these communities, and the financial viability of the state agency entrusted to manage the State Forests, are all dependent upon a suite of forest management activities that best occur throughout an annual cycle to efficiently produce a sustainable supply of timber for sale and harvest. Unnecessary burdens and encumbrances restricting forest management on state owned and leased lands, erode the ability of the lands to be managed to their full financial and conservation value.

Under the definition of "Suitable Habitat" the guideline states "forest stands ... within 35 miles". There has not been a Marbled murrelet nest documented further inland than 30 miles, with the mean being 14 miles. Thirty five miles imposes an unnecessary burden and encumbrance on the lands with no scientific basis of value. I urge the Commission to modify the guideline to "forest lands ...within 20 miles".

The Commission's support for active forest management within the Advisory Survival Guidelines is consistent with the obligation to manage wildlife resources and must consider the best available science.

This letter offers our recommendations concerning your pending decision on the Draft Advisory Survival Guidelines, applicable for the marbled murrelet (mamu) in coastal Oregon forestlands.

I submit these comments on behalf of the 1,000 member companies of Associated Oregon Loggers (AOL), representing logging, transportation, construction and allied forest management businesses working across Oregon. AOL member companies not only manage private and public forests on a contract basis, many also own forestlands throughout Oregon. The management of coastal Oregon forestlands is vitally important to a significant number of AOL member companies. Oregon's marbled murrelet status and management policies are of critical concern to our ability to keep all coastal forests healthy, productive, and sustaining multiple values into the future.

2. We recommend a revision of the survival guidelines to jettison the harmful subjective, precautionary protections and consultations with ODFW. We also recommend that state agencies focus on those federal ESA recommendations and consultation with USFWS (federal information is more robust at this time).
3. Ongoing & future research is necessary before an accurate mamu population status can be determined. There is insufficient scientific or professional experience that would reliably demonstrate that Oregon's murrelet population is in imminent deterioration within its range across Alaska, Canada, Washington, and California.

I make these recommendations in respect for the Commission's commitment to effective Oregon wildlife polices, which make Oregon a good place to grow and harvest trees. RE: Marbled Murrelet Advisory Survival Guidelines

Dear Chair Finley and Members of the Commission,

In testimony before the Commission on June 7, 2018 I urged the Commission to carefully consider the best available current science and acknowledge ongoing research being conducted on Oregon Marbled murrelet populations, and conclude an uplist of the population status was not appropriate given information available to the Commission. The Commission is to be commended for its' thoughtful deliberation and decision based on the best available science and data to not uplist the bird.

On August 3, 2018 the Commission will consider new rules that outline Advisory Survival Guidelines for Oregon Marbled murrelets on lands owned or leased by a state agency. The Commission must again recognize and consider the best available science relevant to the Advisory Survival Guidelines.

Hampton Lumber owns and operates sawmills in northwest Oregon located in the communities of Warrenton, Tillamook, Willamina and Banks. Hampton sawmills in Oregon directly employ over 650 people with family wage jobs, and are the economic and social engines of their respective communities. The sawmills and the health of these communities, and the financial viability of the state agency entrusted to manage the State Forests, are all dependent upon a suite of forest management activities that best occur throughout an annual cycle to efficiently produce a sustainable supply of timber for sale and harvest. Unnecessary burdens and encumbrances restricting forest management on state owned and leased lands, erode the ability of the lands to be managed to their full financial and conservation value.

Under the definition of "Suitable Habitat" the guideline states "forest stands ... within 35 miles". There has not been a Marbled murrelet nest documented further inland than 30 miles, with the mean being 14 miles. Thirty five miles imposes an unnecessary burden and encumbrance on the lands with no scientific basis of value. I urge the Commission to modify the guideline to "forest lands ...within 20 miles".

The Commission's support for active forest management within the Advisory Survival Guidelines is consistent with the obligation to manage wildlife resources and must consider the best available science.

To: ODF&W Chair, Michael Finley and ODF&W Commissioners,

My name is Elin Hagglund. My husband and I are family forest owners in Yamhill county with 70 acres of forestland. The land has been in my family almost 50 years. We manage our timber sustainably for wildlife, clean water, recreation, diversity, and timber production. We rely on timber harvest for income.

We are pleased that the Marbled Murrelet has not been uplisted to endangered as there is reliable information available that Marbled Murrelet populations are stable and increasing in Oregon. As voluntary survival guidelines for Marbled Murrelet are developed please wait to put further restrictions on forestland until we have the science to know what the Marbled Murrelet requires.

If large areas of forestland are put off limits to timber harvest, the infrastructure to produce lumber, etc., will decrease, making it more difficult even for those whose timberland is outside the Marbled Murrelet habitat to market their trees. Wood is a sustainable building material and is far superior to alternatives such as concrete and steel for carbon emissions.

Instead of restricting harvest on older stands, we should end the incentives for shorter harvest rotations. Douglas fir stands up to about 80 years old are growing wood faster than young stands, sequestering more carbon and producing higher quality wood. Longer rotations would result in higher production per acre, less percentage of forestland in a clearcut at any one time, and more habitat available for wildlife that depends on older forests. Clearcuts are not only an economical way to harvest, but an excellent habitat for many species of wildlife.

Thank you for carefully considering these points when developing Marbled Murrelet voluntary survival guidelines.

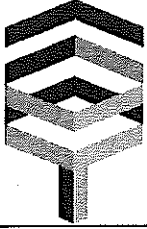

Re: Adoption of Advisory Survival Guidelines for the marbled murrelet

Dear Chair Finley and Members of the Commission,

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments on the Draft Advisory Survival Guidelines for the marbled murrelet (*Brachyramphus marmoratus*). The Oregon Forest & Industries Council ("OFIC") represents over 50 large forest landowners and wood product manufacturers in Oregon. Of the nearly 30 million acres of forestland in Oregon, our members are responsible for managing nearly 6 million. Because the marbled murrelet is found predominately in forested lands of western Oregon, OFIC's members are acutely impacted by regulations surrounding marbled murrelet conservation.

OFIC has as it's core principles; science, stewardship, sustainability, and innovation. Our members pride themselves on having a strong connection with the resources they manage. We are proud of the forest products industry in Oregon and think of ourselves as true conservationists. Science is a strong part of that equation, and our members invest heavily and follow closely the science around forest ecology and fish and wildlife research. We are proud of Oregon's first in the nation Forest Practices Act, which has been amended over 30 times since its inception in 1971, largely as a product of staying closely aligned with emerging science. We feel strongly that all natural resource laws and rulemakings should be based on principles of sound science. In that vein we offer the following suggested edits to the Draft Survival Guidelines.


1. In section 6(a) the guidelines mention protecting sites where subcanopy behaviors have been detected. According to Plissner et al (2015) not all subcanopy behaviors have been strongly connected with known nesting. Notably, Jet dives, a subcanopy behavior, was not considered to be strongly connected with known nests. Also noted by Plissner et al was the problem with defining circling as a behavior; no literature defines the amount of arc necessary to define circling vs simple course correction. The utility of "*subcanopy behaviors*" as a strong predictor of occupancy is fundamentally flawed and highly problematic. For these reasons we strongly encourage these advisory guideline protections be connected with known nest sites.
2. Section 6(a) also suggests protection for "*all continuous suitable habitat in a project area.*" This too is not well supported by science and will likely lead to restrictions to areas having little to no influence on marbled murrelets. This goes beyond protection of "*individual members of the species,*" the stated purpose for survival guidelines under ORS 496.182(2)(a). We suggest removing the reference to protection for "*all continuous suitable habitat in the project area.*"
3. Section 7(a) discusses restrictions on the use of chainsaws and heavy equipment within buffers, this is also not supported in published literature, and likely depends on a host of specific factors, such as the type of chainsaw (electric, for example) or the location of the buffer and the distance from the actual nesting bird (over a ridge, for example). We suggest removing this highly rigid, speculative and unsupported guideline. Alternatively, it would make sense to

include language suggesting consultation with expert biologists when conducting these types of activities in the vicinity of known nests during the nesting season, so site and case specific recommendations could be implemented.

4. Section 7(c) places restrictions of 1 mile on the use of explosives. This too is not documented in murrelet research, and the distance applied here of 1 mile is completely arbitrary. It's highly likely that the use of explosives as an agent for disturbing nesting murrelet depends on the type, amount and frequency of explosives, as well as environmental factors such as aspect and topography. This particular advisory guideline should be amended to remove the moratorium within a 1-mile distance and instead recommend expert biologists be consulted when these activities are planned in the vicinity of a known nest during the nesting season.
5. Under the definition of "Platform" the document references a *"flat surface on a tree limb, which is generally ≥ 4 inches in diameter."* According to research, in Oregon the mean diameter of known murrelet nesting platforms is 10 inches, with a standard deviation of 4 inches. We therefore suggest changing this reference to ≥ 6 inches in diameter, to accurately reflect empirical data which accounts for 95% of the variability.
6. Under the definition of "Platform tree" the document references platforms being generally at least *"33 feet high in a live coniferous tree."* According to research, in Oregon the documented mean height above the ground for nesting murrelet sites is 118 feet, with a standard deviation of 46 feet. Therefore, we suggest changing this reference to ≥ 72 feet above the ground, as this more accurately reflects empirical data, and accounts for 95% of the variation.
7. Under the definition of "Project Area" the document references *"the geographic extent that will be directly affected by the proposed action, plus all continuous suitable habitat within 0.25 miles..."* The additional 0.25 miles is an overreach that is not documented in any empirical data that we are aware of and goes beyond protection of *"individual members of the species,"* the stated purpose for survival guidelines under ORS 496.182(2)(a). We suggest removing the reference to 0.25 miles from the definition of Project Area.
8. Under the definition of "Suitable Habitat" the document references *"old growth, mature, coniferous forest stands... within 35 miles."* According to research, in Oregon there has been no murrelet nests documented farther than 30 miles from the coast, with the mean being 14 miles. We recommend using a scientifically relevant metric. With a mean of 14 miles and a standard deviation of 6 miles, we suggest using 20 miles as this more appropriately accounts for 95% of known murrelet nesting within Oregon.

Thanks again for the opportunity to offer comment. I have confined this letter to what we believe are necessary improvements to the Draft Advisory Survival Guidelines. The information above is offered based on the body of published literature informing our current understanding of marbled murrelet ecology.

Dear ODFW Commissioners —

I gave testimony at your February meeting in support of uplisting the Marbled Murrelet, and was heartened to witness a functioning public process and commissioners who were clearly listening and thinking hard about the issue at hand, and who I feel made the right decision based on the science. I was subsequently dismayed to learn of the reversal of the uplisting decision at your June meeting, where that option had not even been on the agenda. A last-minute family obligation prevents me from being at your Salem meeting tomorrow, so I would like to briefly offer my testimony here and now:

As a textbook author in environmental science, it is my job day in and day out to assess scientific research in an effort to draw informed guidance on environmental issues. My personal assessment of the Marbled Murrelet data available in February told me that the species clearly warrants stronger protection in Oregon. This data-based conclusion is backed up anecdotally by my lifelong personal experience in the field as a birder and longtime member of the Oregon Bird Records Committee, during which I have witnessed apparent population declines accompanied by both new and ongoing threats for a number of seabirds, most notably the Marbled Murrelet. And frankly it does not require a bird expert or a professional forester to recognize that Oregon's current management of its increasingly fragmented patches of forest is grossly inadequate for species that are dependent on groves of healthy old-growth forest.

I feel the reversal decision at the Baker City meeting was an error both in process and in result, and that it went against both the science and the public interest. I would strongly urge the Commission to reinstate its original decision made in February to uplist the Marbled Murrelet from threatened to endangered, and to adopt strong and meaningful mandatory survival guidelines.

I am writing to express my deep concern regarding the misinformed and inappropriate decision the ODFW Commission made at the June 7th meeting in reversing their decision to uplist the Marbled Murrelet from threatened to endangered under Oregon's Endangered Species Act.

The Commission decision in June completely ignored the full breadth of scientific evidence that was thoroughly researched and vetted by ODFW staff and compiled in the Marbled Murrelet Status Review Report that was presented at the February ODFW Commission meeting when the Commission voted to uplist the Marbled Murrelet to endangered. The status review not only provided ample justification for uplisting based on decades of scientific evidence, but it also clearly documented an accelerated rate of logging on state lands since the Marbled Murrelet was originally listed back in the 1990s as well as demonstrating that existing state programs and regulations are inadequate to protect the species or its habitat.

We urge you, at the August 3rd meeting, both follow through on uplisting the Marbled Murrelets to Endangered and to approve mandatory (not voluntary) Marbled Murrelet survival guidelines consistent with those originally provided by ODFW staff at the June 2018 meeting. Please require land-managing agencies to adopt the Pacific Seabird Group Protocol as the "Approved survey" for monitoring state forest lands for murrelet occupancy, presence, and potential absence. Please also require protection of all high quality suitable Marbled Murrelet nesting habitat (both occupied and unoccupied).

Only such mandatory, enforceable guidelines will help provide strong protections for Marbled Murrelets and their habitat that will help the species recover from a historically low population and a high probability of extinction in Oregon.






